

## CASH BONUS BILL AGREED UPON TODAY

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE)  
WASHINGTON, April 30.—Payment of a cash bonus to American war veterans of \$1.25 for each day of service in excess of sixty days is provided in a bill agreed upon this afternoon by the Republican majority in control of the house ways and means committee.  
"Victory taxes" are provided to raise funds for the payment of the bonus.  
Besides the cash bonus, there are four optional plans of compensation proposed.  
An unadjusted paid up insurance policy; vocational training; trade farm or home aid and land settlement aid.  
The special taxes provided to raise revenues to meet the soldier payments are:  
Increased sur-tax of one per cent on net income between \$5,000 and \$10,000; two per cent between \$10,000 and \$25,000; three per cent over \$25,000. Stock and bond transfers and produce exchange sales between Dec. 1, 1919, and

Nov. 30, 1922; two cents on each \$10 of face value, or 20 cents on each share with face value. After Dec. 1, 1922, two cents on each \$100 of face value; real estate sales, 25 cents for each \$50 of payments; an average of 15 per cent increase on existing cigars, snuff and tobacco taxes; sales tax, one per cent.  
A revolving fund of \$300,000,000 is appropriated from the treasury to help put the proposed bonus legislation in immediate effect.

Ohio has been counted in the ratification column, but if the court allows a referendum on suffrage it will be necessary for the suffragists to obtain ratification in another state if women are to vote for the next president. Among the prominent suffragists at the hearing were Mrs. Richard Wainwright, wife of Admiral Wainwright and member of the executive committee of the national woman's party; Mrs. Abby Scott Baker, political chairman of the party, and Miss Sue White, chairman of the party's research division.
