

## LABOR SHORTAGE CUTS OUTPUT

Only a labor shortage prevents the steel mills in the Calumet section from operating at 100 per cent efficiency, according to a statement made yesterday by E. J. Buffington, an authoritative spokesman for the steel industry.

Stating that the mills were flooded with orders and that the outlook was most promising, Mr. Buffington said:

"As far as transportation improves the steel industries will increase their output. This cannot begin to take care of the orders that are coming in, but it will not be long before they operate on a 100 per cent basis. A labor shortage is causing some of them to work short handed, but an improvement is expected. No shutdown is contemplated."

**Gary Sails July 20 For Europe Industrial Tour**

NEW YORK, July 1.—Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel Corporation, is planning to sail for Europe about July 20th, according to a report issued today. It is stated that he will make an extensive trip through all the allied countries investigating conditions and requirements and that he may visit Germany and Austria.

## FIX STANDARDS OF HIGHWAYS

**State Commissioners Take Action to Obtain Uniform Construction.**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 1.—Uniform road construction is expected throughout Indiana as a result of an order issued today by the state highway commission requiring the standardization of road plans and specifications for county highways which are subject to the approval of the commission. The regulation is effective July 1 and covers all county road projects submitted to the commission for approval.

The regulation is similar to the Federal order requiring the use of standardized plans and specifications by the state for all roads for which government aid is expected. The action of the commission extends the use of the approved standards to the roads which will be built in Indiana under the provisions of the county unit road law, by which the state shares the cost.

**SAME AS U. S. STANDARDS**

## ADMINISTRATION LEADERS PLEADED

**Antis Look for Marshall to Be Forced into Breach if Deadlock Comes.**

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Administration leaders voicing the opinion of the president, look upon the beginning of the third day of the session of the Democratic convention with unfettered satisfaction, assuming the unlimited control they have held in the organization will continue during the remainder of the week.

Russell Newcomb of Indianapolis, was re-elected adjutant in a lively little battle with Cavins Baughman of Evansville. Other officers elected were: Stanley Switzer of Seymour, finance officer; the Rev. J. A. Lord of Hebron, chaplain; Scott W. Shield of Brownstown, sergeant-at-arms; William A. Steward of Bloomington, historian, and James Mason of Gary, athletic officer. Dr. T. Victor Keene of Indianapolis, was re-elected national executive committee member by acclamation.
