

PROHIBITIONARY TO MEET IN LINCOLN, NEB.

Effort Will Be Made To Join
With the Anti-Saloon
League of America

COLUMBUS, O., July 13.—The question of whether Wm. J. Bryan and his following will ultimately support the democratic ticket was the one subject that occupied most of the attention in the conference held here yesterday between Gov. James M. Cox, democratic presidential nominee, Secretary Franklin D. Roosevelt, his running mate, and Judge Timothy T. Ancherry of Washington, Gov. Cox's political adviser.

It was learned that the Commonwealth sent a personal message of well wishes to the vice presidential candidate through a former secretary, telling him he was glad he had received the nomination. No word has yet been received from him by Gov. Cox.

OMAHA, Neb., July 13.—Organization of all the "dry" in the country into a separate political party with Wm. J. Bryan at its head, was predicted here today by Elmer E. Thomas, one of the "dry" leaders in Nebraska on his return from the democratic convention at San Francisco.

News Held Official.

Mr. Thomas was an alternate from Nebraska at the convention and was closely associated with Mr. Bryan during the later pre-convention campaign in this state. His statement, in view of the fact that he is regarded as an official spokesman, is considered to be the first indication of Mr. Bryan's plans since the holding of the San Francisco convention.

Present Bryan's Name.

The name of Bryan probably will be presented at the national convention of the prohibition party, which meets in Lincoln, July 21. Mr. Thomas intimated, and he said that an effort will be made to obtain the support of the Anti-Saloon League, which holds a national meeting in Westerville, Ohio, July 22.

Thinks They Could Win.

"My idea is that the two bodies may get together and put a 'dry' candidate in the field," he said. "I hope the 'dry' forces of the United States will unite in the nomination of Mr. Bryan. If they do so I believe they could win."

"I don't know whether Mr. Bryan would accept a nomination of this kind if it were tendered him. My statement is made without intimation on his part that he would run on a 'dry' platform, but I hope he may have the opportunity."

SOUTH SHORE SERVICE WAS POOR THERE

The South Shore car service between East Chicago and Indiana Harbor was discontinued for several hours yesterday because all of the cars which have been in use on the local track were out of order. Service has been maintained recently by using one of the large cars from the main line, but yesterday the motor on that car burned out and it was necessary to wait until another car could be brought from the barns.

With only one car running the company maintains a 40-minute service instead of the usual 20-minute service. The poor condition of the track between East Chicago and Indiana Harbor is believed to be responsible for much trouble that has recently made it difficult to keep the local cars in order.

TRANSFERRED TO DIST. COURT

On motion of the defendant, the suit of Nicolas Palman against the Western Union Telegraph company, has been transferred from the Hammond superior court to the U. S. District court at Hammond. This is the case in which Palman, an Indiana Harbor man, desired to transfer \$1,000 in U. S. currency to Indianapolis, Indiana, in order that he could purchase a business establishment. The money was never delivered to him, but instead, the bank after long delay offered him "a number of thousand of less." As the business opportunity has slipped in the meantime Palman is sprung for the \$2,000 plus \$500 damages. He is represented by Attorneys Ida B. Davis & Stinson and A. C. Pales, while the attorney for the defendant is H. P. MacCracken.

PROGRESSIVES CONFER WITH SEN. HARDING

Candidate Goes into Retirement to Work on Speech Of Acceptance.

MARION, O., July 13.—Senator Warren G. Harding, republican nominee, conferred this morning with Congressman Nicholas Longworth of Cincinnati, and then went into retirement to work uninterrupted on his acceptance speech.

The senator announced that he could give no more time to conferences until after he has completed the draft of his speech, which he is preparing with the greatest care. All his time yesterday was devoted to conferences with his callers.

Congressman Longworth and Mrs. Longworth, who was Alice Roosevelt, daughter of the late Col. Roosevelt, were house guests of Senator and Mrs. Harding last night. The discussion between the senator and Nicholas Longworth covered national as well as Ohio state politics. Longworth is a candidate for re-election to congress. If elected he is expected to be a candidate for the speakership of the national house of representatives.

Raymond Robins of Chicago and Walter F. Brown of Ohio, leaders in the "Pull Moose" campaign of 1916 and prominent progressives, were in conference with Senator Harding throughout the afternoon yesterday. Robins discussed with the senator labor and progressive legislation.

COLORED VOTERS MAKE A PROTEST

Protests are being made by the mass of colored voters in Gary regarding the appointment of Judge Henry Wellner, by the board of county commissioners at Crown Point last week and according to a resolution passed at a monster mass meeting on the south side Sunday afternoon, they say they will pull away from the Republican ranks if the rights of the colored citizens of the city are not recognized. It will be remembered that Judge Wellner was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Frank Zawacki, and the colored voters petitioned that Charles Gregory, a well known colored political worker of the city be appointed to fill the vacancy.
