

# PROHIBITION PARTY TO MEET IN LINCOLN, NEB.

Effort Will Be Made To Join With the Anti-Saloon League of America

COLUMBUS, O., July 13.—The question of whether Wm. J. Bryan and his following will ultimately support the democratic ticket was the one subject that occupied most of the attention in the conference held here yesterday between Gov. James M. Cox, democratic presidential nominee, Secretary Franklin D. Roosevelt, his running mate, and Judge Timothy T. Anshery of Washington, Gov. Cox's political adviser.

It was learned that the Commissioner sent a personal message of well wishes to the vice presidential candidate through the anti-saloon league, telling him he was glad he had received the nomination. No word has yet been received from him by Gov. Cox.

OMAHA, Neb., July 13.—Organizing of all the "dry" in the country into a separate political party with Wm. J. Bryan at its head, was predicted here today by Elmer E. Thomas, one of the "dry" leaders in Nebraska on his return from the democratic convention at San Francisco.

Mr. Thomas was an alternate from Nebraska at the convention and was closely associated with Mr. Bryan during the latter's pre-convention campaign in this state. His statement, in view of the fact that he is regarded as an official spokesman, is considered to be the first indication of Mr. Bryan's plans since the holding of the San Francisco convention.

Present Bryan's Name.  
The name of Bryan probably will be presented at the national convention of the prohibition party, which meets in Lincoln, July 21. Mr. Thomas intimated, and he said that an effort will be made to obtain the support of the Anti-Saloon League, which holds a national meeting in Westerville, Ohio, July 23.

Thinks They Could Win.  
"My idea is that the two bodies may get together and put a 'dry' candidate in the field," he said. "I hope the 'dry' forces of the United States will unite in the nomination of Mr. Bryan. If they do so I believe they could win. I don't know whether Mr. Bryan would accept a nomination of this kind if it were tendered him. My statement is made without intimation on his part that he would run on a 'dry' platform, but I hope he may have the opportunity."

The South Shore car service between East Chicago and Indiana Harbor was discontinued for several hours yesterday because all of the cars which have been in use on the local track were out of order. Service has been maintained recently by using one of the large cars from the main line, but yesterday the motor on that car burned out and it was necessary to wait until another car could be brought from the yards.

With only one car running the company maintains a 40-minute service instead of the usual 20-minute service. The poor condition of the track between East Chicago and Indiana Harbor is believed to be responsible for much trouble that has recently made it difficult to keep the local cars in order.

## TRANSFERRED TO DIST. COURT

On motion of the defendant, the suit of Nicholas Pats against the Western Union Telegraph company, has been transferred from the Hammond superior court to the U. S. District court at Hammond. This is the case in which Talsan, an Indiana Harbor man, desired to transfer \$2,000 in U. S. currency to Bukarest, Roumania, in order that he could purchase a business establishment. The money was never delivered to him, but instead, the bank after long delay offered him "a number of thousand of less." As the business opportunity has slipped in the meantime Pats is suing for the \$2,000 plus \$500 damages. He is represented by A. C. Feltz, while the attorney for the defendant is H. P. MacCracken.

## COX EXPLAINS ALLEGED PRO-GERMAN EDITORIALS

Eastern Newspaper Arraign Democratic Candidate for Lusitania Editorials.

DAYTON, O., July 13.—Selection of Ed. H. Moore, of Ohio, as chairman of the democratic national committee, regarded as almost a certainty, when the committee meets here in July 26. Moore, who is national chairman from this state directed the campaign which brought to Gov. James Cox, the democratic nomination for the president.

HE ADMIRES MOORE  
Gov. Cox repeatedly expressed his admiration for the generalship displayed by Moore in the convention fight and has called Moore the best organizer of the party. Inasmuch as Gov. Cox attributes his nomination to Moore it is believed that he will make every effort to have Moore make national chairman and director in chief of the Cox campaign.

Before the second representation of farmers in as many days, Gov. Cox announced his intention of making his first act, if elected, the appointment of a "dirty" farmer as secretary of agriculture. He stated that he had no man in mind at present, but would select a man who made a success both from the standpoint of practical farming and of business efficiency.

CANDIDATE ARRAIGNED  
The arraignment of the candidate by Eastern newspapers because of the pro-German editorials appearing in his newspaper at the time the Lusitania was sunk, was brought to his attention. He replied that while he did not wish to dodge the responsibility for them in any way the truth of the matter that George Burba, a member of his editorial staff, had written the articles. He pointed to his war record as governor of Ohio and that in 1918 he lost out in the German counties of the state as facts which leave no doubt in the minds of the public as to where he stood.

The governor left early today for Columbus by automobile where he will make his headquarters from now on.

## PROGRESSIVES CONFER WITH SEN. HARDING

Candidate Goes into Retirement to Work on Speech Of Acceptance.

MARIETTA, O., July 13.—Senator Warren G. Harding, republican nominee, conferred this morning with Congressman Nicholas Longworth of Cincinnati, and then went into retirement to work uninterruptedly on his acceptance speech. The senator announced that he could give no more time to conferences until after he has completed the draft of his speech, which he is preparing with the greatest care. All his time yesterday was devoted to conferences with his many callers.

Congressman Longworth and Mrs. Longworth, who was Alice Roosevelt, daughter of the late Col. Roosevelt, were house guests of Senator and Mrs. Harding last night. The discussion between the senator and Nicholas Longworth covered national as well as Ohio state politics. Longworth is a candidate for re-election to congress. If elected he is expected to be a candidate for the speakership of the national house of representatives.

Raymond Robins of Chicago and Walter F. Brown of Ohio, leaders in the "Pull Moose" campaign of 1916 and prominent progressives, were in conference with Senator Harding throughout the afternoon yesterday. Robins discussed with the senator labor and progressive legislation.
