

Gary Man Runs Amuck From Drink

Intoxicated and violating every traffic rule in Gary with one or two exceptions, Adam Bock, 2555 Jefferson St., Gary, attempted to convert Broadway into a speedway during the noon hour yesterday.

Narrow escapes from collision and injury were many, traffic was thrown into a state of commotion, passengers alighting from street cars were forced to jump for their lives and how he missed street cars, automobiles and other vehicles is only a mystery.

It is said that Bock, a native to Beck Beer, was half crazed from the effects of drinking white mule. Police officers first spied his racing auto south on Broadway at Eighth avenue when an effort was made to bring the speedster to a halt. But Bock only glanced around, turned on more gas on his Overland car, and his life depended upon it.

Commanding the road a passing auto, the police had to chase some distance behind. If a machine was in his way on the south bound side of the street, Bock would swerve over to the north traffic right of way, barely missing automobiles and pedestrians in his wild ride.

Twenty-Sixth avenue his machine veered, almost toppling over and he swerved the heavy car into an alley near his home where he was placed under arrest.

LABOR FEDERATION AFTER HARDING AND COX

COLUMBUS, O., July 22.—The campaign of the American Federation of Labor to acquaint its membership with the labor records of presidential candidates Harding and Cox is in full swing today.

Tonight secretaries of thousands of local chapters of affiliated unions throughout the U. S. will read a formal announcement from national headquarters that the Federation has prepared a comparative resume of the stand taken by the candidates on labor questions which have come before them.

This record will cover the entire public career of the candidates and will set forth not only their vote on legislation dealing with labor, but also their public utterances and the editorial policy of their newspapers.

At a later date the statement says, similar records dealing with senatorial and congressional candidates will be distributed.

The greater part of the information contained in the resume of the attitude of Senator Harding and Gov. Cox toward labor was furnished by the Ohio State Federation of Labor.
