## BETTER PROSPECTS FOR ADJOURNMENT

Special Session of Legislature Sure to Adjourn Tomorrow, it is Believed.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., July 27—Chances for an early adjournment of the legislature were more favorable today than they have been at any time since the special session convened two weeks ago last Monday, following the release by the senate to the house of the Kiper tax cure bill by a vote of 14 to 12. The bill had been tied up in a conference committee for several days. The decision of the senate, it is believed, will tend to relieve the tension which has existed between the two bodies of the legislature for some time and restore harmony in the legislature for some time as dredges harmony in the legislative halls.
