MAJOR SENDS  
POLISH NEWS

A first hand story of the precarious situation in which the new Polish republic finds itself was received this morning by Mr. R. D. Ostrowski of Hammond in a letter from his brother, Major Leonard Ostrowski. Major Ostrowski, who was formerly a practicing physician of Indiana Harbor, is now with the American Red Cross at Warsaw, Poland.

At the time the letter was written, July 5, the Poles were being driven back by the Bolsheviks from all sides and he was convinced that a manifesto calling to arms all able bodied Poles, in July 7 he witnessed a manifestation in the form of a parade in which thousands of people took part. The parade stopped in front of the British legation displaying the numerous banners, which were being carried. Some of them asked that the proposed manifesto be stopped and others called for more recruits for the army.

"Everybody seems to be very anxious, as though of impending grave danger," writes the major. "I have nothing to tell you about the Poles as they seem to be getting along all right."

On July 11, the Poles celebrated "American day" the letter continues. "It being Sunday and a beautiful day, brought all the Warsaw people out. In the morning the Bishop of Warsaw said mass at New Soldiers church, meeting the old Russian church on Plac Sienki. The church was packed with people and for us was reserved a place before the high altar. The Americans were represented by the first section, the representatives of the army and all of the rest of the commissions. A section followed by Rev. Slogoski, Poland's foremost speaker.

"From the church we went to the opera house where a place was provided for us on the balcony at the foot of a temporary erected statue of Liberty. From there we were able to view the parade. Thousands of small children lined up in the square facing us with all sorts of banners, uniforms, colors of dresses, caps and distinguishing devices. Each one carried a little American flag and at a given signal they began to wave them. They sang America's national anthem in Polish while the several military bands did their share. At the climax an aeroplane appeared and circled over the square, throwing out bouquets of flowers which landed on or near the statue of Liberty.

"In the evening a reception was held in honor of the Americans, comprising speeches by some of the foremost men of Poland. It was attended by a large number of Polish celebrities, one whom I remember most distinctly was General Haller. He has a very pleasing appearance and is liked by the Warsaw people. After short talks by prominent speakers a book filled with signatures of Poles and offering thanks to Americans was presented. The response was made by the first assistant of the American legation in English. I am sure that the entire event was influential in bringing Poles closer to the American hearts as I could well see the happy expression upon their faces."

Major Ostrowski believes that Poland today considers America her first friend. He expresses regret that his brother is not able to be with him and see it all, but urges him and other American-Poles to help the motherland all they can at this time of stress. "Don't let the Poles get her as they try hard to buy her with bolshevik money," he says.

The Indiana Harbor man occasionally finds time to visit other parts of the country. He tells of visiting Kalisz, a small village of only 20 houses. In spite of its size, the place maintains a consularium, has its own co-operative stores, agricultural school and everything. Kalisz has suffered by the war, but is showing lots of pep. "The country is very beautiful," he says, "the crops looking promising. The rice is yellow, tall and ready for the sickle. Yesterday I came from Lublin, south-east of Warsaw and saw the cathedral and all places of interest. If things go on well there will be no starvation here. We eat berries and cherries until we are black in the face."

"As I was coming back from Lublin yesterday, we came to a railroad crossing at which stood a train with troops going from the eastern border. They don't seem to care and are glad to fight. They think it's more fun at the front than staying at home. They say the Poles have taken all possible men up to 60 years old and are going to make one desperate effort to crush Poland, but that a battalion of Poles can take care of a division very nicely."

In the five mile amateur stock car event, Ed. Brayach, riding an Indian, took first in 5 minutes 43.4 seconds. McAfee, also riding an Indian came in second and C. Jacobson on an Excelsior was third.

McCarthy, riding a Harley-Davidson won the five mile side-car race in six minutes 13.2 seconds. Ed. Brayach was second and Cropp, third.

A. J. Sliger who is backing the Roby races was delighted with the way things turned out Sunday. The crowd was larger than he had expected and the only spill was in the first lap of the opening event when Kelly was injured seriously enough to put him out of the running.

More work will be done on the track and it will be in even better condition for the next race meet which will be held within a couple of weeks. Prominent in the crowd were hundreds of Chicago people who had been drawn to the Roby track and seemed well pleased with the speed exhibitions.

**ORPHEUM SEASON ENDS**

Last night marked the end of the season at the Orpheum theatre and today the popular show house is closed. Tomorrow Jim Michelstetter, the manager, will climb into his coupe and beat it for his fruit farm in Wisconsin. Paul Bennett, his assistant will see to it that the place is redecorated and made fresh and cheery once more. For three weeks, with the exception of the three days on which the American Legion show will be held the theatre will remain closed.

AT SUNDAY  
RACE MEET

With a crowd of spectators, estimated at 1,000 the old Roby race track at Robertsdale Sunday was the scene of one of the liveliest motorcycle race meets held in the county this year. The mile dirt track had been worked up to fine condition and stood up well under the severe usage.

The opening event was a one mile trial for a track record. Walter Korn the Indian speed merchant hung up the track record of 51.7 seconds. Other riders will try to lower the mark.

Korn also grabbed first place in the three professional races. In the first ten mile race his time was 9 minutes and 42.5 seconds. A. Johnson, on an Excelsior, and Cropp, also on an Excelsior, took second and third respectively.

In the second ten mile race Korn's time was 9 minutes and 27 seconds. However, on a Harley-Davidson and Cropp on the Excelsior took second and third.

Korn's time in the five mile professional was 4 minutes 11.2 seconds. Hoover and Cropp came in second and third.
