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## DEAD TIMBER.

Many business men are dead from the ground up. They have reached a certain point and feel it is their limit, and that their town also has got all the advantages and expansion it can.

When they are not working to build up a bigger business, they are forming plans for a better development of their community.

They don't wait until next week or next year, but they go right at it and when that is done they try something else. When a city has a group of business men of that type, you can no more stop its growth and development than you can stop the growth of a young and healthy tree, says the Lafayette Journal.

## "NEIGHBORS' DAY."

Designation of certain days for special observance of one thing or another is being carried to the point where such days threaten to become cheap through their numerousness. Not content with single days, we also are giving whole weeks to the spread of propaganda, such as shipping by truck, to which a week recently was devoted.

The call for the observance of three special days has just been issued by the governor of Mississippi. The thrifty man saved paper and labor by putting all three into a single proclamation. A novelty is offered in "Neighbors' Day," which is set for Saturday, June 12. The governor states that in advocating the celebration of this day he is complying with resolutions adopted by the national conference on community organization, which met in Washington on March 20, last, and was attended by several delegates, representing thirty-three states.

Bearing in mind that "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself" is a major commandment, one can find nothing amiss in devoting a special day to the promotion of good will and the community spirit among neighbors. On the contrary, much good can be made to come from such an observance.

But it is time to call a halt on special observances intended principally to serve selfish commercial interests. Caution should be exercised in multiplying all these special celebrations lest, because of their frequency, all should come to be ignored, and the good suffer along with those for which there is no need.

## SHOES AND SEA LIONS.

If sea lions are as plentiful in the waters of British Columbia as reports indicate, the recommendation of the premier of the province that they be slaughtered and their skins used for making shoes is of more than academic interest. Four men who went hunting for them recently killed 700 in two days. There is probably no likelihood that shoes of sea lion leather will come into general use; but as a cheap substitute for footwear of calfskin and cowhide they will find more favor than the wooden shoes which some of the bolder foes of high prices have been advocating.

But is there not danger that the British Columbia premier's invitation to slaughter the sea lions may

lead to their extermination. There is one consoling thought, however, in connection with the prospect of a depletion in the supply of sea lions. Their disappearance should result in an increase in the supply of food fish, for the average sea lion eats about 50 pounds of fish a day.

## WE'LL SAY ITS HIGH TIME.

## CAPITALIZING THE TOWN PUMP.


