

U. S. SAILORS ARE LOST

INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE
WASHINGTON, Oct. 4—One man was lost and one officer and four men were injured while the U. S. destroyer Goldsborough was crossing a sandbar outward bound from Tampico, Sept. 30, the afternoon dismissed a petition for an injunction to prevent the endorsement of the suffrage amendment.

E. & O. ASKS AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4—The Baltimore & Ohio railroad today applied to the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to issue refunding and general mortgages 6 per cent bonds to the extent of \$1,558,000 to mature in 1925, but redeemable at 105 after 1926 at the option of the company. The road also applied for authority to issue general and refunding 5 per cent bonds for subsidiary roads to the extent of \$2,975,000.
