

THIS THIEF IS BUSY WORKER

A thief, who canvasses his neighborhood in a thorough house to house manner, put in his appearance in Hammond last night. As a result of his visit more than a dozen homes in the new West Park subdivision of Roberts, one sought aid of the police department this morning.

Practically all of the houses of the subdivision are two story affairs and families sleep upstairs. The burglar carried a short ladder in order to gain entrance through first floor windows. Once inside he ransacked the entire lower floors without once arousing any of the sleeping inmates.

The losses vary from nothing to \$400. The maximum sum represents a quantity of jewelry taken from one home. In many instances the thief secured only \$0 to 70 cents for his trouble, but he always left a trail of confusion and disorder in his wake.

Nine householders reported visits by the thief early this morning, and the police later discovered four more in which windows were open. In the latter cases the families were not at home and the extent of the loss could not be learned.

MAC SWINEY ON 56th DAY OF FAST

LONDON, Oct. 7.—From his bed in the Brixton Jail infirmary, Terence MacSwiney, the hunger striking lord mayor of Cork today sent what may be his final message to the American people. The message was sent through his brother, Peter MacSwiney, of New York, who has just arrived here. It says:

Terence wishes me to say that he sends love to President de Valera, of the Irish republic, his colleagues and the American people. He and his comrades in the Cork Jail are determined

to offer up their lives for the Irish republic. Terence is very weak, but conscious and his determination has never wavered.

This was the fifty-sixth day of Terence MacSwiney's hunger strike. Peter MacSwiney was deeply shocked at the change in his brother's appearance since he last saw him. Terence is emaciated almost to the point of death. The bones of his face and limbs and his ribs protrude through his skin. His eyes are sunken until they are almost invisible. He cannot speak above a whisper.

The Cork lord mayor was indignant over reports that he was taking nourishment. He told his brother he wished to emphasize that he is dying for a principle and for the freedom of his country.

It is rumored that, in the event of MacSwiney's death in the immediate future, the government will not allow a public funeral to be held in Cork.

HAMMOND SUPERIOR COURTS

Judge Hardy and a jury in Room 2 are hearing the suit of William F. Gerrity vs. Thomas D. Williams, et al for the replevin of an automobile. Gerrity claims possession of the machine on the grounds that it was stolen from him and turned over to a garage owner in Indiana Harbor. Williams was then chief of police in East Chicago. He took possession of the car under dispute and because parts of different machines had been juggled in order to make it difficult to identify the machine, he refused to turn it over to the plaintiff.

He at once accused Wilson of the theft of the money, but Wilson denied this, he was guilty. Sergeant Knott was sure that Wilson stole the money and an hour later in a search at Wilson's home, \$132 of the money was located. Wilson had driven home in a taxi and gave it to his wife.

He was booked on a charge of grand larceny and following a fine and sentence in the Gary city court yesterday morning Wilson was taken to Crown Point and arraigned before Judge Martin Smith in the criminal court.

Judge Smith also found him guilty, fined him \$5 and costs, imposed a sentence of 1-14 years and disfranchised him for a period of 5 years.

STATE TAX LEVIES CUT TO 20 CENTS

Board Rescinds its Action of Sept. 28 Following Conference with Governor

The state board of tax commissioners today reduced the total of 1921 state tax levies from 22 to 20 cents. The present total of levies is 18 cents, fixed last year for this year. On September 28 the board fixed 22 cents as the total for 1921. Following a conference with Governor Goodrich, the board issued the following statement: "The state board of tax commissioners today took up the reconsideration of the state tax rate. Owing to payments made into the state treasury from some of the state institutions just prior to the end of the fiscal year, September 30, and of which there was no previous knowledge, the condition of the state finances was very substantially affected thereby."

FLYNN HOLDS 4 ANARCHIST SUSPECTS

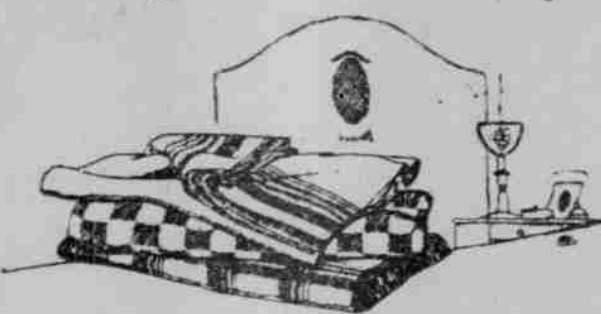
