

# DECLARES HE HAS MISLEAD THE PUBLIC

Democratic Candidate Vehemently Attacks Harding Statement.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 8.—A demand that Senator Harding apologize for "misleading the American public" was voted by the Indiana senate today in a speech here in which he vehemently attacked the republican candidate's declaration that President Wilson refused to counsel with the senate and insisted upon ratification of the league covenant without consulting an "I" or crossing a "T."

COX SIMULATES ANGER  
"The senatorial candidate may choose either horn of the dilemma," the governor said, "but I affirm with out fear of contradiction that anyone who says the president never sought and never heeded the advice of the senate is either grossly ignorant of contemporary history or grossly insincere. There is no third alternative."

SAYS HARDING DODGED  
In charity of judgment, the governor said, he wished to assume that Senator Harding simply did not know what he was talking about, and intimated that the senator's habit of "dodging roll calls" might explain his ignorance were it not for the fact that the records of the senate showed he

had voted against the Hitchcock reservations.  
EXCHANGE OF VIEWS  
"There was more than one frank exchange of views between the president and the senate," the governor continued, "suggestions as to amendments were offered by senators and made a part of the resolute reservations were proposed by members of the senate and accepted by the president. And these things were not done in a corner. It is true that Senator Harding dodged 1162 roll calls which might explain his absence from the senate when important questions were being discussed and important matters decided. The records, however, show that Nov. 5, 1919, was one of the days when he was present and he voted against the Hitchcock reservations, along with Borah and Johnson, Knox and Penrose, Smoot and Watson and Newberry."

ASKS FOR APOLOGY  
These conversations dealt directly with all objections raised against the covenant, Cox said, and were intended to "reassure those Americans who entertain any doubts whatever as to the retention of our national rights as a member of the league."  
"I suppose it is too much," said Gov. Cox, "to ask that mediocrity pay to the grateful tribute of truth, but confronted with the plain facts, it ought not to be too much to ask that the senator apologize for misleading the American public."

## CHAFING OF SHOE BRINGS HIM DEATH

HOBART, Ind., Oct. 9.—Mr. Lawrence Kraft is dead at his home on Lillian street from pneumonia. He had been sick only three days but had a blood poisoning of his ankle caused from the rubbing of a shoe. He was 31 years old and is survived by a wife and two children. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the home and will be in charge of the Modern Woodmen lodge of which he was a member.

# SEEKS TO COLLECT ON POLICY

And Seljan of Whiting is attempting through the Hammond superior court to collect on a life insurance policy held by her husband, Gido Seljan, who is now insane and confined in Longview asylum at Logansport.

Seljan joined the Croatian society of the U. S. A. at Whiting, June 21, 1919. At the same time he took out a life insurance policy with the society which provided that in event of insanity, the wife was to receive \$100 at once and \$400 at the time of death. Mrs. Seljan has been unable to get a settlement as yet. The society bases its refusal upon a policy clause which provides the policy in case the disability is due to the use of alcoholic liquor. The plaintiff will attempt to show that Mr. Seljan was insane for nine years before he was committed to the asylum, and that alcohol played no part in it.

## T. N. T. DELIVERED TO EMBASSY

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A steel shell filled with five pounds of "T. N. T." to which was attached a detonating cap and which was packed in a shoe-box was today turned over to agents of

the department of justice by a clerk employed in the Russian consulate at 104 Fourth avenue. The clerk told officials that the shoe box containing the deadly missile had been delivered to the embassy.  
No one at the consulate could explain where the shell came from or when it was received.  
The Russian consulate does not represent the Russian soviet government, but is being maintained by funds left by the former Russian government.
