

BOSSE SAYS TAX LAW IS A GOOD ONE

Democratic Leader Repudiates Statement in Party's Platform.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 15.—There is nothing wrong with the tax law, says Benjamin Bosse, Democratic leader, in a statement issued here today.

The Indiana legislature is creating a set of conditions that will cause a radical change in the tax law, and throughout the state. The simple and direct language of this statement is in keeping with the reform tax law passed by the Republican legislature of 1919 and amended by the special session of the assembly last year.

Bosse, who is chairman of the Democratic state committee, said that it is the statement of Warren T. McCray, Republican candidate for Governor, or E. M. Wasmuth, Republican state chairman, that is not the case, however. The legislation stamping the reform tax law with approval is the utterance of a other person than Benjamin Bosse, Democratic mayor of Evansville, and chairman of the Democratic state committee. The statement was made at a public hearing before the Vanderburgh county council when the proposed bills for the city of Evansville were under consideration.

The statement is a direct repudiation of the ranting of Dr. Carlson K. McCray, Indianapolis candidate for Governor on the Democratic ticket, who has been wandering all over the state saying that the tax law was a "tax on eating with the wholesome food of the state and asserting that if he is elected he will have the tax law repealed."

This statement is also a direct repudiation of the Democratic state platform of 1920 which said: "We pledge the state legislature, if Democratic, to repeal this tax law."

Further than this, the statement of the Democratic state chairman is in accord with the declaration of the Republican state platform of 1920 which says:

"We commend the last General Assembly for its action in revising the tax law of Indiana. The virtues of this law commend themselves, the defects have been made apparent through its enforcement."

It is a matter of common knowledge that the defects which led to the Republican platform adopted in May were corrected by the special session of the legislature in July.

The Evansville Journal in commenting on the statement of Chairman Bosse said:

"The mayor's admission that the so-called Goodrich tax law, the Republican measure which he and his cohorts all over the state have been denouncing in violent terms, was all right, earned a gasp of astonishment among politicians present at the hearing (last Sunday)."

Those who are in the inside of developments in Indiana politics in Indianapolis are not astonished at the statement, however. They had noted previously that Thomas Taggart, of French Lick, candidate for United States senator, had evidently ordered the planning of the soft pedal on vilification of the Republican state administration as such appeals to the voters were not making any headway. In the light of this it is not at all surprising that Bosse had a friendly word to say for the tax law, which he so lately denounced.

The incident at Evansville is being regarded as only another verification of the fact that the Democrats are from now on going to play the "League of Nations" as their last trump card. They have lost hope of being able to put over their state ticket. Therefore they are making every effort to at least save Taggart from the fate of the rest of the Democratic candidates in Indiana. By centering their appeal on the Wilson League of Nations convention the bosses at the Denison hotel believe they may be able to elect the man from French Lick.

In these last sixteen days of the campaign the Democratic state organization is working hard, day and night, to get the general victory that they now feel certain will be achieved by the Republican state and national ticket, but to cut down pluralities. They realize that only by a small general plurality will they be able to put over any one candidate. With a small plurality for

the hands of the ticket they are hoping that there will be enough scattering to send Tam over and possibly to elect a few representatives to congress.

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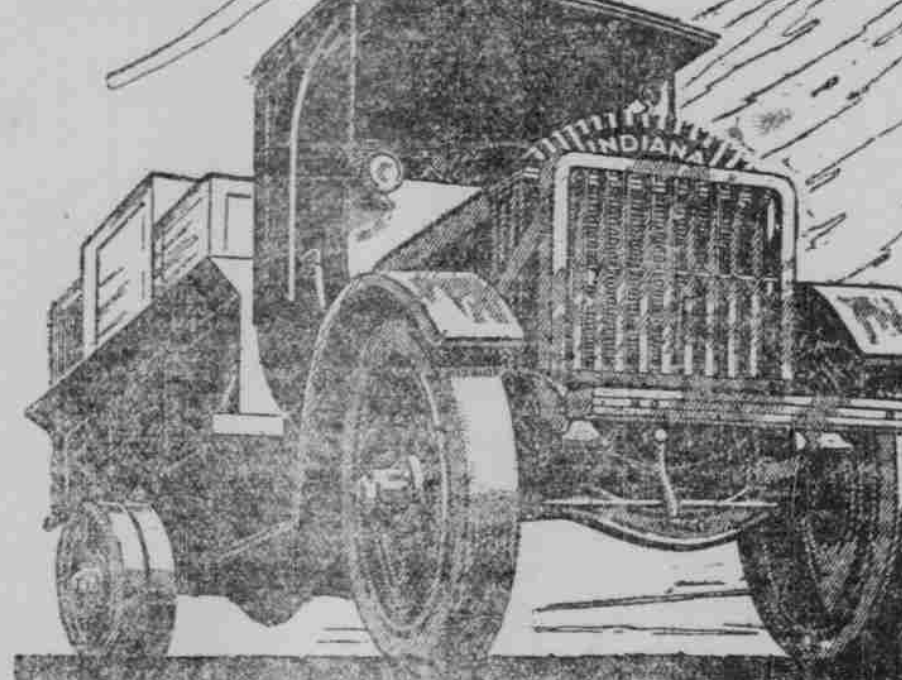
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
