

HODGES WILL NAME FRANCIS SUCCESSOR

Before leaving for East Chicago this morning where he spoke on Municipal Government, in a noon-day luncheon before the Chamber of Commerce, Mayor W. F. Hodges made the statement to a Times reporter that he would announce the name of a Gary man within the next day or so to succeed City Clerk Herbert Francis, who was ousted from office yesterday.

As predicted and told exclusively in this Times, City Clerk Francis was found short in his accounts by examiners C. E. Weyhert and J. D. Glendebaker, from the office of the board of accounts. The shortage is said to amount to more than \$1,000.

Today Francis is out of a job. Mrs. Francis, who has been employed in the office since the new administration took office will take charge of the clerk's office until the mayor names a successor.

His administration facing a number of criticisms, Mayor W. F. Hodges ousted Francis from office. Putting it in mild terms, the mayor was indignant and as much as told Francis to "get the hell out of here," referring to the clerk's office.

I have nothing more to say than that I will appoint someone to fill the vacancy just as soon as possible," said the mayor, when questioned by a reporter.

Meanwhile Francis is using every effort to raise enough money to cover the deficit, but according to reliable information his former friends have deserted him and Francis finds himself in a plight. So far he has not been arrested. This is the second time that these examiners have found Francis short in his accounts during his term of office. The first time he was short some \$500. Friends came to his assistance and made the shortage good. Through some error it is learned that Francis never supplied a bond and technically is not a city official until he has filed a bond with the controller. The shortage is for fees paid in the city court. In the neighborhood of \$1,000 of this amount belonged to County Prosecuting Attorney Clyde Hunter.

Francis's salary as a clerk, only amounts to \$2,500 a year. His wife drawing a salary of \$1,250 a year as a clerk in the office. Mrs. Francis did not have the slightest knowledge of any shortage until informed by a friend.

VIOLATIONS OF COAL ORDERS ARE CHARGED

Three Indiana Companies Cited by Commission. Sales Above Margin

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Nov. 10.—The state coal and fuel commission has cited three Indiana coal companies and two mine operating companies to appear before it Saturday at 10 a. m. and show why their licenses to do business in Indiana should not be revoked. They are alleged to have violated the orders of the commission. The companies are the Ogle Coal Company, wholesaler, Indianapolis; Wink Coal Products Company and Vico Mining Company, both of Terra Haute. They are the first companies to be cited to appear on behalf of their licenses. It is alleged that thousands of tons of coal were sold at prices or margins higher than is legal in Indiana.

The Ogle company is alleged to have charged more than 15 cents a ton for handling coal as a wholesaler since the commission issued its order early in October, fixing 15 cents a ton as the maximum jobber's charge. One hundred and twenty-four specific violations of the order are contained in the notices of the hearings.

The coal, alleged to have been loaded with a higher than legal margin, was sold in Indianapolis, Michigan City, Kokomo, Columbus, Mervinstown, Elwood, Hartford City, Martinsville, Lebanon, Warsaw, Boonville, Albany, Wabash, Anderson, Marion, Greensburg, Spencer, Salem and Noblesville.

The purchasers who got the coal, for which they are alleged to have been required to pay a higher than legal margin, include the names of many manufacturing corporations, large and small retailers, public institutions, public utility companies, a state university and a private benevolent institution.

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DENY MAKING OF TAX APPOINTMENT

Mr. Brown has been a member of the tax board for four years, being appointed by Governor Riley. He was reappointed by Governor Harrison at his statehood and made close friends in the state house.

The report of the investigators, A. M. Fisher and J. M. Richardson, former employees of the board, was made to the committee sitting in New York City.

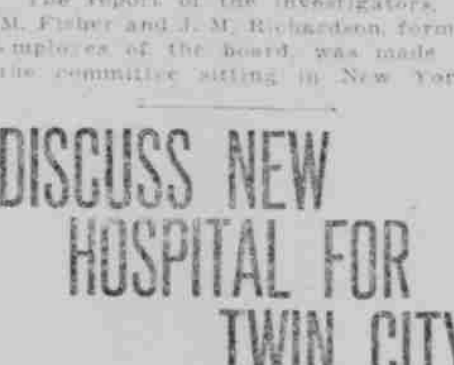
At a meeting last night of the officers of East Chicago and Indiana Harbor held at the club there, a temporary chairman and committee were appointed to work out a plan whereby East Chicago and Indiana Harbor may have some definite word as to the construction of a hospital for the Twin City.

A greater part of the evening was given over to the appointment of a committee, which will be empowered to negotiate with the different industries in the matter of financial help and as to the type of building most acceptable for the hospital.

Many plans discussed. Considerable wrangle was entered as to whether it would be best to erect a residence property and transform it into a temporary hospital and later erect a large commodious building at the very beginning. The latter plan, which seemed to be desired among the citizens, who pointed out that a small residence turned into a temporary hospital would be an added embarrassment with very little assurance of becoming a success. It would eventually prove to be a financial burden. City Attorney Critch, who spoke on the subject as to city and county aid and told his audience that under the laws of Indiana, they could not expect any aid from the city or county until they had erected a building and had the hospital in operation. Even under this condition, said Mr. Critch, aid cannot be extended until it is entirely proven that the hospital is a losing proposition, then he promised that the city and county have the power to come to the aid of the hospital.

The plan asking for the aid of the industries was opposed by William Jewell, who said that in any proposition to make what it may be, the first thing suggested is to try the hospital and further stated that he was opposed to this plan until they had some definite plan to work on at which time it might be possible to secure the help of the industries. Judge W. A. Fink, proposed and suggested one of the most feasible plans and said that let the citizens get busy and do a little something on their own hook, and further stated that the industries have always extended their aid for better development of the Twin City, and that a committee of citizens be empowered to co-operate with a hospital committee of the industries. This plan was adopted. Roy W. B. McIntire of Indiana Harbor was unanimously appointed chairman of the citizens committee. The committee appointed to negotiate with the industries include: Roy E. Jones, chairman, Judge William Fink, John Patterson, Mrs. J. G. Dickson, president of the Woman's Club, Indiana Harbor, and Mrs. A. A. Ross, president of the East Chicago Women's Club. The committee were asked to make their report at a meeting to be held within the next 10 days.
