

HARDING AT LAST GETS REST

ON BOARD S. S. PARIMELA, WITH
PRESIDENT-ELECT HARDING, NOV.
18.—If the feelings of President-elect
Warren G. Harding could be expressed
in three words today, those words
probably would be "safe at last."

For the next five days or until the
steamer Parimela arrives at Christ-
mas, President-elect Harding will en-
joy an unbroken rest on board the
steamer. Not since before his pre-
vention days before his nomination
did the senator have five days in
which he did not have to make a
speech or five days in which he was
secure against callers of various kinds
and descriptions. For five days, at
least, he is free of office-seekers and
free from those who want a little private
word with the next president. For
at least 108 hours there will be nothing
but rest.

LOW SALARIED PEOPLE CARRY TAX BURDEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Low salaried men and women, and no war mil-
lionsaires, are carrying an overwhelm-
ing percentage of the government's tax
burden, it was announced by the inter-
nal revenue bureau today in disclosing
partial figures on the 1918 tax returns.
Computing the tax liability of persons
having salaries of \$5,000 and less, the
bureau said this group paid income tax
on net incomes aggregating about \$9-
\$10,000,000 or about 80 per cent of total
net income. Men in the class of mil-
lionsaires, or better paid, the basis of
net incomes, scarcely exceeding \$1,000-
\$2,000.
Total tax paid the government, in
personal returns, including both normal
and surtax, amounted to \$1,127,721,000,
based upon total net of \$15,024,000. The
average individual tax was \$244.33, as
against the decrease in the millionaire
tax payer group, a heavy increase was
noted among other tax paying classes.
There was a growth of 322,224 in the
number of returns filed and an increase
in total net income reported of \$2,272-

000, likewise an increase of \$130,000-
000 in total taxes collected by the gov-
ernment.
Prosperity among American women
was reflected by the filing by 30,942
wives of returns separate from their
husbands incomes.
The number of joint returns of hus-
bands and wives, with or without de-
pendent children and of husbands, whose
wives, though living with them, filed
separate returns was 2,329,097, with
such returns showing net income
amounting to \$10,842,000,000.
Single women, listed as heads and
supporters of families, filed 82,224 re-
turns, their total net income aggregat-
ing \$273,000,000.
Single men filed 1,129,261 returns rep-
resenting total net income of \$2,120-
000,000.
Single women, not supporters of fam-
ilies, filed 233,851 returns, representing
total net income of \$729,000,000.
Salaries, wages, personal services
and similar sources were the basis of
\$2,267,000,000 in net incomes upon which
revenues were paid to the treasury.
Income derived from business, trade,
farming, real estate, stocks, etc. repre-
senting net income of \$4,590,000,000.
The bureau has not finished comput-
ing data from returns of partnerships
and corporations for the calendar year,
1918.
