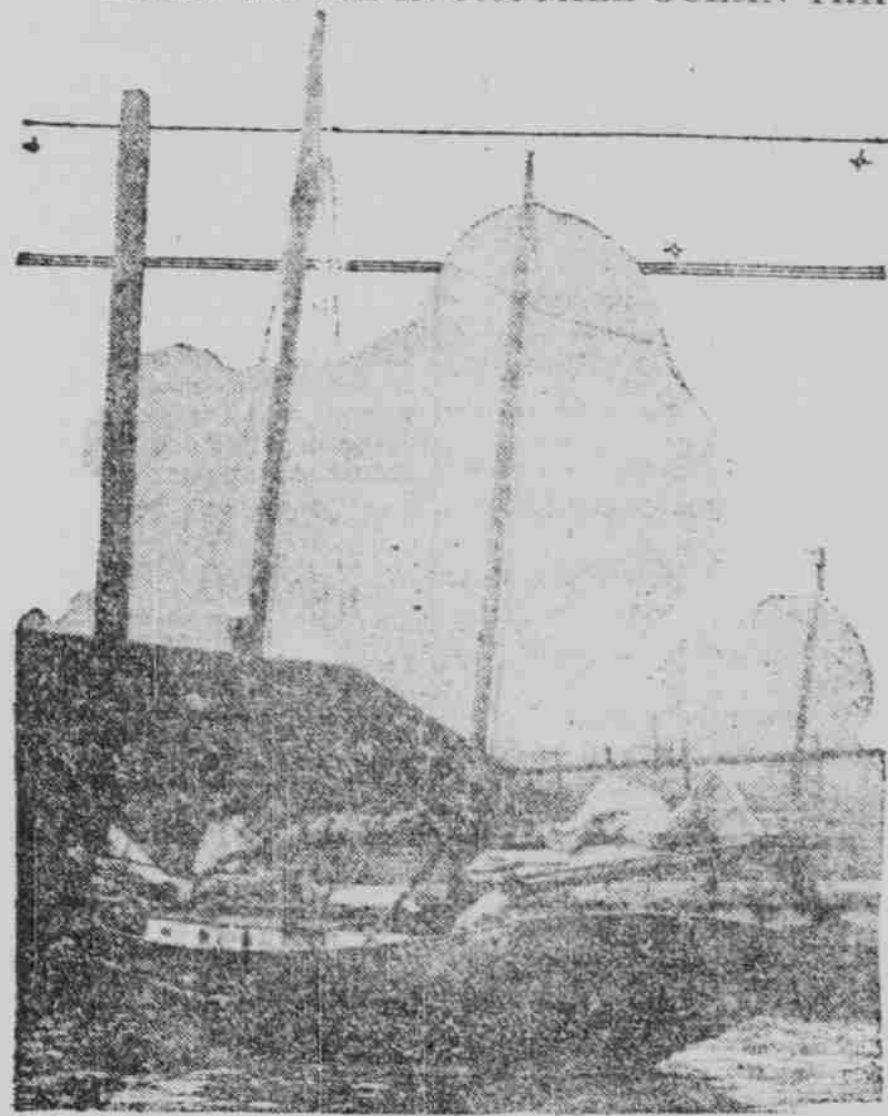


TINY BOAT OUTDOES COLUMBUS' FEAT: BESTS WAVES IN 8900-MILE OCEAN TRIP
