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TAXES, COMING AND GOING.

Concerns and individuals who made payment of federal taxes on the instrument plan this year will find that the business of contributing to the support of the government is lapsing over in a not very pleasant way. The last payment of taxes for the year 1919 will be due on December 15, and treasury officials will expect that all payments be made on or before that date. Blanks for making returns of incomes and profits during 1920 will be available January 1.

In spite of the taxing machinery which has been in operation for several years, the government agents are forced to admit that many thousands of persons have been able to evade their financial obligations to the government, notwithstanding the penalties provided for delinquency. The rate on normal incomes for 1920 will be the same as last year—four per cent on the first \$4,000 above exemption, which is \$2,000 in the case of married persons and \$1,000 for those unmarried. It is expected that there will be a considerable shrinkage in receipts from incomes and profits in 1920, especially as the last half of the year has witnessed a marked reduction in earnings of industrial workers, and a consequent decrease in the earnings of employers.
