POLITICAL MEETING

WARN AGAINST WASTE

Officials of the East Chicago and Indiana Harbor Water company, are issuing a warning to their patrons on the unnecessary waste of water. According to statements from their engineers, water just dripping from the faucet, wastes 15 gallons of water daily, which will average 105 gallons a week or \$4.50 gallons a year.

Our filtration plant, say officials, on which we have been working for more

than two years, is now completed and in operation. This plant is one of the most modern in the United States, and has cost the company more than \$100,000.

We are furnishing a very satisfactory water from this plant, but the filtration of water costs money, and a wastage of water will be expensive to the consumer.

Under an order of the Indiana Public Service commission, all water will be furnished by meter measurements and if the patrons waste water at their faucets or fixtures, or service lines, their water bills will be high.

Twin City News Notes

Under the direction of the civic department of the Indiana Harbor Woman's Club a most splendid meeting was held yesterday afternoon at the Katherine House. A few brief matters of importance coming under the supervision of the general club committee was disposed of with Mrs. J. C. Dickson, club president, in the chair. Mrs. B. C. Lukens, chairman of the department entertaining, introduced the speakers of the afternoon. Miss Edna Morgan, teacher of English in the Washington high school chose for her subject high school curriculum, rather than public school system, and her affiliation with the high school for eight years made her talk all the more interesting and important for the personal experiences inducted and the true knowledge gained in such channels. If space permitted one could readily write in exhaustively of the chief features of Miss Morgan's talk, the growth of the high school was paramount among them and the many organizations and the purposes they serve. Chiefly among them was the explanation necessary for high school students to take the junior college work and enter any of the colleges in a sophomore year; colleges recognizing the degree of the junior college diploma and accepting the student accordingly. "The aim of the high school of today," Miss Morgan said, "is to fit the student for life citizenship rather than to fit them for college preparations alone." She dwelt

upon the importance of developing self-expression, initiative and responsibility in the student, and mentioned the various societies in the school that is developing that trend status. The social side of the student term and Miss Morgan urged the very best co-operation on the part of the parents in this particular phase of the work through proper direction and control. Her concluding remarks were voiced in behalf of the movie machines being installed for further educational prospects, and the first showing announced for Tuesday evening, when Donagel may be viewed. The other speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. Sengur, wife of Prof. Sengur, of the Riley school. Her

talk was based strongly on the physical education of the child as its most necessary asset, and told of some of the conditions existing in the local schools where teachers subdivided classes in order that the more individual attention might be bestowed where in-ertness was due to the lack of vigor. Mrs. Sengur's study of conditions has led her to believe that the day is not far distant when greater importance will be attached to outside gymnasiums in preference to the indoor games of today, and told of the Switzerland schools where each child as a part of each hour's study is given ten minutes of recreational time. The meeting of yesterday was most profitable to mothers and the talk by both teachers so well

qualified to handle their subjects was a real treat to those present.

At a meeting of club women at Indiana Harbor yesterday the resignation of Mrs. Norman Cole was read, as the treasurer of the Indiana Harbor Woman's Club and Mrs. George M. Witt elected to succeed her. It is owing to Mrs. Cole departing from the city that her resignation was given in. She has been a most important factor in club work and her loss will be a keenly felt one.

Mrs. M. C. Gavin, in charge of all collections for the Armenian relief fund of the Indiana Harbor Woman's Club is desirous to forward amount at a very early date and requests all the members to send the amount of fifty cents to her. The club voted to take care of an Armenian child and the money so contributed will be used for that purpose.
