POLICE SAY O'BRIEN KILLED HIMSELF

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 30.—For the second time within two weeks, the supposedly self-inflicted death of Lieut. Pat O'Brien, famous war aviator, at a local hotel on Dec. 17, was apparently a closed case today in the police records. Captain of Detectives Hoffman announced that a re-check of the case had confirmed the first finding that O'Brien had killed himself.

SEEKS TO LIFT RATES

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 30.—The Indiana Natural Gas and Oil company today petitioned the public service commission for authority to increase its rates to a schedule graduated from \$1.50 per 1,000 cubic feet for the first 20,000 feet to \$1.15 per 1,000 for gas in excess of 20,000 cubic feet consumed for services from its base Chicago and Green town stations. The petition seeks a minimum monthly rate of \$1.10 with 10 per cent discount for payment in 10 days.
