

MAYOR SCHRAGE AGAIN A CANDIDATE

Whiting's Popular Mayor Tireless Worker for Good of the City

WATER MEETING IS HELD AT E. CHICAGO

The water meeting at the East Chicago city hall was not as largely attended as was anticipated due to the error of the hour appearing in the notice published in The Times, but those who were there were keenly enthusiastic in the movement suggested by the chairman, Jesse Dowsy, that a large delegation of representative citizens be sent to the hearing of the public utilities whether that hearing is to be in Indianapolis or Hammond. According to the Hon. Edward W. Jones who was in Indianapolis and conferred with the governor at the same time that committee from East Chicago-Indiana Harbor were there, it is more likely that the commission will be held in Hammond.

A. P. TWYMAN TAKES. The principal speaker of the evening was Attorney A. P. Twyman who gave a most complete and concise report of the committee's visit to the governor and the presentation of the claims to come before the public utilities. In the excess meter bills of the present day, for which citizens have become justly indignant. It was Mr. Twyman who also delivered the message from the East Chicago city council to the governor for the abatement of the public utility commission and was advised by the executive to give the members of that commission a chance inasmuch as he believed the fault did not lie with the present members of the commission. Attorney Twyman told of the examination of the water company's books and stated figures prior to and including filtration installation, giving present per capita consumption of two hundred and thirty-two gallons daily in East Chicago. He contrasted that with South Bend's output of seventy-two gallons, largely a manufacturing site and believes that wastage plays a most important part in the large consumption here and that leakage is a grave factor. He advised greatest conservation to attain an economical basis in payment of a reduction from twelve to eight million gallons since meters were placed. Minimum rate was discussed and the placing of meters within the dwellings proper.

That there is to be no service charge was made clear. The sprinkling of laws and gardens is yet a problem to be worked out. That the only true solution to the present condition is to purchase the water company for municipal ownership was the unanimous opinion of all present. A movement is afoot to perfect a permanent organization of the Citizens Protective League and to gain finances necessary to carry on the important work of having duly elected officers and maintaining requirements. The committee returning from Indianapolis said they were in the hands of the city and citizens' interests. They were rendered a vote of thanks at the meeting.
