
HOUSE LEADERS SEEK TO PREVENT JAM

The "steering committee" consisting of representatives Newman, Osborn, Gibbons, Mallott and Morgan was named late yesterday by representative Nook, republican caucus chairman.

With the operation of the "steering committee" floor leader Fife is hoping to do away with night sessions until Monday night, when the legislature will adjourn sine die.

The couple had been married about seven years. In 1918 they moved from Indiana Harbor to Denver, Colorado. Later Betts returned, rented a house and furnished it. Then he wrote his wife to return "if she was willing to live straight." She had been making it miserable for Betts in Denver by running around nights and frequenting saloons. Margaret refused to return and Betts turned the furnished house over to a friend.

PORRAS APPOINTS DEFENSE COUNCIL

BALROO, Panama Canal Zone, March 2.—A council of national defense has been appointed by President Porras of Panama, to initiate and carry out necessary military action to defend the country against Costa Rica. There is one American member, A. R. Merrill, assistant legal agent of the Panama government.

Passengers on a Pacific mail liner arriving here today via Puntarenas reported that the steamship Isabel and the motor schooner Belenquezada were at Puntarenas with from 300 to 500 Costa Rican soldiers on board armed with cannon. Both vessels were ready to sail. The passengers also reported anti-American feeling in Costa Rica as a result of the belief that the United States will support Panama in the territorial controversy.
