MISSION SEEKS U. S. AID IN CENTRAL AMERICAN UNION



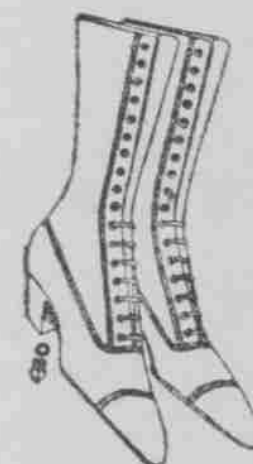
The Guatemalan mission snapped in Washington.

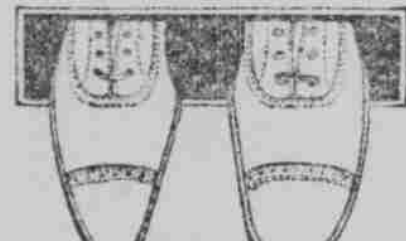
