Due to the rigid campaign conducted by the Gary police force for several years and the passage of some stern ordinances, the violation of traffic laws and automobile infractions have been greatly reduced in the past year according to a report compiled by Chief of Police Forbis of Gary for the Indiana Anti-Saloon league today.

With the above report a letter was also sent to the Indiana Anti-Saloon league which in brief Chief Forbis says:

"In the recent years our city council have passed some good ordinances and wish I could say as much for some of our state laws using the old adage: 'There are none so dumb as those who will not learn.'"

"During the past year we have adopted the green tag system and it has proven very much of a success. In case the autist leaves his car standing at the curb and is violating one of our traffic laws the officer ties a tag on the steering wheel on which he has written the offense and invites the offender to visit the station. A stub from the ticket which the officer puts in his pocket to be turned in at the station bears the same information.

"Twenty-five hundred of these tags have been used up in the past year and I might say that few are ever sent in a second time. In case they do, we look over our records and if we find they have been sent in once before, we file charges against the owner. Unless, for some serious offense charges are never filed for the first offense.

"Regarding automobile stealing it is my opinion that forty per cent of the automobile owners are at fault themselves. The owner leaves the car on the curb line in many cases with the engine running inviting the thief to jump in drive it away and steal it.

"As a prevention I would prescribe some simple device of some kind known only to the owner and driver. Patented devices are not as good as the thief as a rule becomes acquainted with them and able to get away with the machine if he has a little time.

"In eliminating many traffic infractions and accidents we use white zone paint for street and curb marking 'stop' printed in large thirteen letters at crossings and boulevards and 'slow down' at dangerous places.

"We have safety zones for passengers alighting and boarding street cars and are now marking the approach of railroad crossings with caution signs. Street markings are much better than the standing signs as the good driver will pay heed to them as the general rule.

"In closing I would say that traffic cops have the toughest jobs on the department. Every driver should be his friend. He is stationed there in all kinds of weather for the purpose of 'hawking out' the traffic violator but also to protect life and limb of women and children while they cross the street to safety and regulate traffic as prescribed by law."

RIGID SCIENTIFIC TEST APPLIED TO MILLIONS OF BUSHELS OF SPOT GRAIN



SPOT GRAIN

CHICAGO.—Thirty thousand cars of grain have been inspected in a single month by the Illinois State Grain Department at Chicago, its record day's work, according to a report just issued, being 2,520 cars. This department, with its corps of scientific grain testers, prepares samples for sale on the Chicago Board of Trade where 400,000,000 bushels of cash grain on tracks or in elevators for immediate delivery are bought and sold annually.

This tremendous cash grain department, together with the futures market which provides hedging, or grain insurance, represents a seventy-three year evolution in grain marketing. Leading economists, including Herbert Hoover, have characterized the board as the most economical food marketing machinery in the world. In the face of attacks upon the futures market by organizers, thousands of members of farmers' societies recently have adopted resolutions opposing legislation destroying hedging at least until a giant grain

marketing system can be built up as a possible substitute. Bankers, business men, agriculturists and grain experts told Congress that legislation destroying the exchanges would be "a blow to the nation's industrial and economic structure" and both producer and consumer would suffer.

To Spend \$300,000 on New Improvements
