A new structure to cost \$25,000.00 will be started in the near future according to the plans of Deutsch and Borken, who yesterday obtained a permit from the Building Commissioner's office.

Married 33 Years Husband Sues for Divorce

In a complaint filed in the Gary Lake superior court by George W.

Lyon, he alleges that after being married to his wife, Alameda for 33 years, she left and abandoned him without cause. He states that she is now in Cleveland, Pa.

The couple were married in Fishing Creek, Pa. in 1886 and separated April 21, 1919. Plaintiff asks for an absolute divorce.

Husband Quarrelsome Wife Wants Divorce

Characterizing her husband as quarrelsome, jealous and used abusive language, Mary Tonkovich asks for a divorce in a complaint filed in the Gary Lake superior court. She charges that he accused her of dressing up for other men; that he was addicted to strong drink; that he abused their two children, and generally conducted himself in such a manner as to make life miserable for his wife and her two children.

She further alleges that her husband owns the property located at 1113 Massachusetts street and including this building he owns property to the amount of \$10,000.00.

She asks that the custody of her two children 11 and 9 years of age be given to her; that she be granted a reasonable amount of money for their support and \$10,000.00 alimony.

She further asks that the bonds of matrimony now existing between her and her husband be forever severed, and that she be granted an absolute divorce.

DIVORCE GRANTED JOHN SHAFFER

In the Gary Lake superior court, a divorce was granted to John Shaffer by Judge Charles E. Greenwald. Mrs. Shaffer was granted the custody of their son, Tugus, eight dollars per week and \$150.00 alimony.

A separate maintenance suit was brought by Mrs. Shaffer some time ago, and this morning's verdict was the climax of an old drawn out suit.

Baldserrri Divorce Case Continued

Judge Greenwald this morning continued the case of Louise Baldserrri vs. Frank Baldserrri.

The complaint filed by Mrs. Baldserrri alleged that Frank was guilty of cruel and inhuman treatment; that he would not speak to her for weeks at a time, and generally made life miserable. There is one child. They were advised to get together and make up and a reconciliation is expected.

Hold Inquest in Dr. Hartman Death

Inquest into the death of Dr. Hartman, who was found dead in bed at the Stanley hotel in Gary last Saturday, was finished by Coroner E. E. Evans yesterday with a verdict of death by natural causes with indication of suicide by taking cyanide of potassium, a deadly poison. It was also brought out that Dr. Hartman, who has been a resident of Gary for the past four months, had been an addict to narcotics.
