

DOWN AND OUT DRIVE UNDER WAY

"A man is down but he's never out." This slogan of the Salvation Army—the most beloved of all benevolent associations—is to be capitalized in Hammond May 9 to 17 in a campaign to raise funds for the rescue work in Hammond. A penny will go out of the state and not a dollar to any foreign country. Ninety per cent of the revenue will be devoted to the work in this city.

The fellow who is down, the unfortunate girl or woman you would like to help but can't except through the Salvation Army are to have the benefit of your contribution.

At a meeting of the Hammond advisory board of the Salvation Army at the chamber of commerce recently plans were made and committees appointed for the campaign. Attorney Jesse Wilson was made chairman and Howard Deschelder, secretary and treasurer of the drive. An advance gift committee was appointed consisting of Frank S. Ritz, chairman, and the presidents of the various banks of the city. Attorney Joseph H. Conroy was appointed president of the speaker's committee.

Hammond quota is \$10,000 and the first contributions will be made through the advance gift committee and the joint effort of the chamber of commerce, the Rotary club and the Kiwanis club.

The members of the advisory committee of the Salvation Army in Hammond are Jesse Wilson, H. E. Sharrett, H. J. Geschelder, E. N. Bunnell, P. J. O'Rourke, Morse Dell Plaine, E. Shanklin, Joseph H. Conroy, Carl E. Nelson, Edwin S. Monroe, E. S. Jones, Charles Taylor and Mayor Dan Brown.

The schedule for the four minute run includes speeches by Jesse E. Wilson, Morse Dell Plaine and Joseph Conroy at the Parthenon, Orpheum, DeLuxe, Pastime and Bijou theaters, Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week.

Regarding the purposes of the campaign Mr. Conroy said today:

"The results of the experience of the war both at home and abroad have emphasized the need of organized home and social service work to meet the needs of that class of people who are down and out, and the unfortunate man or woman such as the man who has been sent to prison, the man addicted to drugs and those who are outcasts socially; dependent children, and to relieve sickness and distress."
