### STEEL & TUBE CO. MAKES REPORT

The Steel and Tube company of America for the year ended Dec. 31, 1920, reports net profits of \$142,955,650, with a surplus after inventory adjustments and other deductions amounted to \$4,215,300. The profit and loss surplus as of Dec. 31, 1920, was \$1,092,820. The general ledger sheet as of the close of last year showed net current assets of \$25,500,762, compared with net current liabilities of \$15,312,077.

### DEATH OF MRS. ANSLEY

Genevieve Ansley, only daughter of Mrs. Pearl Ansley of 3515 Geppine street and of the late Dr. Robert Ansley, prominent physician and surgeon of Indiana Harbor, died last evening at the age of 11 years, after an illness of several weeks, first brought about by an infection of the tonsils, which later developed into pneumonia. The young lady was a student at the Washington high school and beloved by all who knew her. The news of her death this morning came as a distinct shock to the entire community. Since the early stages of the illness two trained nurses had been constantly employed at her bedside. Her chances at various times for recovery seemed hopeful until the dread pneumonia germ set in. The deceased was a niece to former Judge Homer Ansley of Indiana Harbor. No funeral arrangements have been made at this time.
