

ONE ERROR FOUND IN U. S. HAMMOND SLACKER LIST

Hammond's list of alleged slackers and army deserters was made public today by the War Department and preparations are being made by the American Legion and various officials to check over the list and see if any of them can be apprehended.

One situation has already been found in which it appears an error was committed. The list contains the name of Fred Paul Wehmeyer, 444 Summer st. Information which has been gleaned hurriedly reveals that Wehmeyer served in the army. He was killed by a train after returning to Hammond nearly three years ago. His widow married Albert Schultz a year ago and now resides at May and Carroll sts.

It is possible that other mistakes have also been made, and persons who have been thus offended should not hesitate to get themselves right as patriotic organizations have promised to "make it hot" for any persons listed who can be located.

As an example of the fact that the government means business, a carload of prisoners was taken through Hammond Thursday on the Nickel Plate railroad. They were draft evaders, or deserters as they are now termed, headed for the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan.

Hasty check of the names listed for Hammond show that the majority were transients and the addresses are frequently rooming houses. Negroes and men of foreign birth constitute the bulk of the list.

The list from Indianapolis announced Thursday contained the name of Frank Walter Hitchcock whose home was given as 317 Morton ave., Hammond. The building at that address was then occupied by the Mt. Zion Baptist congregation, a colored organization. It is now used for a soft drink parlor.
