

## BAR ADOPTS MEMORIAL RESOLUTION

An eloquent memorial resolution for Judge Walter T. Hardy of Hammond, was adopted by the Lake County Bar Association at a special meeting today and will be spread on the records of the courts of Lake county and an engraving of copy sent to Mrs. Hardy. The resolution was prepared by a committee consisting of Attorney J. H. Conroy, Jesse E. Wilson and Glenn D. Peters. It follows:

**IN MEMORIAM**  
To the Officers and Members of the Lake County Bar Association:

It is with extreme sorrow that your committee announces that the mortal life of the Honorable Walter T. Hardy has ended.

Subpoena has been served and at the returned day full answer was made. From that Court that knows no default has brought before it our honored, respected and beloved friend. The

last entry in the book has been made and the Chief Justice of the Universe has signed the final decree. No one can say but that our beloved friend has faithfully and completely fulfilled the obligations that life has imposed upon him, and while his mortal remains are gone, yet he will live in our hearts and our minds and give to us a proper example of an honest and courageous public servant.

The judge of the Lake Superior Court his duties included the making of American Citizens. On October Third, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-One, from all parts of the county, men who had a desire to share in the benefits and responsibilities of this Government, gathered before him and presented their claims to be allowed to share in such citizenship. His court room was crowded and as the proceedings progressed this judge, inspired with his desire to establish in the hearts of those who were before him the significance of their purpose, by demeanor and word brought to their attention the doctrines of true Americanism and the stability and permanence of American institutions. During all of the day his mind and his heart functioned at their full capacity and centered upon the greatness of this duty. When this day had finished and when this man had performed his full duty, he retired from the bench and went to his home, cheerful and with a consciousness of duty well performed; and there, as a cavalier of old, offered himself as a living sacrifice to the

Walter T. Hardy came of a family of good Hoosier American stock. He was born in Carroll County, Indiana, May 24th, 1859. After an education in the common schools of that county, he entered Wabash College where he completed the sophomore year. From there he entered the Chicago Kent College of Law, graduating therefrom in 1885. Soon thereafter he took the oath as a member of the bar in Indiana and began the active practice of the law in Delphi, Indiana. In 1907 he came to Hammond and after engaging in the general practice until 1914, was called to the bench and served as Judge of the Lake Superior Court, Room No. 2, until his death. No man, either an opponent or associate, can say anything against Walter T. Hardy as a lawyer, and no man who practiced before him can say aught but that he was a just judge, a courageous judge, and an honorable judge.

Walter T. Hardy had the courage of his convictions. Neither fear nor favor swayed him. He was a man of intellectual integrity, and having been satisfied of the rights of litigants, a fearless judgment and a quick one came from the bench.

Above all things else that characterized our departed brother was his intense humanity. No man who came in personal contact with him but has gone away his friend. His analysis of character was complete; his sincere and genuine sympathy for humanity's joys and sorrows was unusual.

To say these things of one whom we all knew so well seems a waste of words, but we feel it but proper that we put on the records of this Court and this Bar those things which we all know so well. The passing of Walter

T. Hardy is a distinct loss to this Bar and his place is one which will be difficult to fill. We can say that Walter T. Hardy was a true friend, a devoted husband, and a just judge.

## THIRTY INDICTED NEBRASKANS ARE OUT OF COUNTRY

(INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE)  
OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 5.—Thirty bankers, financiers and business men indicted by the special Douglas county grand jury probing the "financial scandals" which are said to have resulted in near a billion dollars loss to investors, have fled to Mexico, Cuba, and other points outside the United States, it was intimated today by Attorney General Davis.

A special corps of deputy sheriffs is scouring Nebraska for persons named in the grand jury indictments returned Monday. Davis said today that he did not expect success in apprehending many of those named in the indictments.

Indictments that have been made public so far charge the dozen men under arrest with embezzlement and conspiracy in violation of Nebraska's "blue sky" laws. Charges contained in indictments against those not yet arrested have not been made public. It was reported today that several attorneys representing corporations involved in the alleged illegal transactions are named in the indictments. Another special grand jury to continue the investigation may be called, attorney-general Davis said today.
