## AVIATORS BRAVE WINTER 26 HOURS TO SET NEW WORLD'S ENDURANCE RECORD

"If our oil feed system hadn't broken down we would have stayed up seven hours longer." That's the first thing Eddie Stinson and Floyd Bertrand said when "thawed out" by hot drinks and food at Minerva Field, N. Y., after they had set a new world's record of 26 hours, 19 minutes and 25 seconds for continuous flying. For over a day they had circled low above the field, fighting a gale and zero temperature. When the oil feeding system broke after several hours the pair had to desert their warm cabin to stay near the engine to feed oil into the motor by hand.

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


