NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The stock market closed weak today. The unsettled condition became more pronounced in the late decline when western houses offered large blocks of various stocks causing further sharp declines. The general Asphalt prices were weak, the common dropping 1/2 point to 2 1/2. Houston Oil yielded over four points to 7 1/2 and Mexican Petroleum showed a loss of four points at 10 1/2.

Railroad shares reacted from 1 to 2 points. U. S. Steel was also in supply, falling over one point to 8 1/2. Nearly 100 railroad bonds were sold. Government bonds unchanged; railway and other bonds weak.

Total sales \$100,000 today. 24,700 shares; bonds \$14,769,000.
