

FOUR POWERED TREATY IS NOT ALLIANCE

Liberty of Action Is Reserved By All Parties to Agreement.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—The official announcement by a high British official that Great Britain does not regard the four-powered Pacific treaty already signed, as the five-powered naval treaty, now being drawn up in any way constituting offensive or defensive alliance, went far today toward clearing the conference atmosphere as the end of the two months' party have into view.

It is the official view of the British government that the two treaties reserve the right of "liberty of action" to all the signatory powers and that interpretation also is concurred in by the American government.

The only restraining clause, according to British interpretation, is that existing in the Pacific treaty, which pledges the signatory powers to "communicate fully and frankly" with each other in case of trouble between two of the powers party to the agreement or with an outside party.

So far as Great Britain is concerned, it was announced officially in case of attack she reserves the right to increase her navy immediately to any figure she may deem advisable, and expects other powers to do the same. It would be an act of grace, however, for a nation under such circumstances to notify the other powers.

"The naval treaty is essentially a treaty of peace, not of war," said the British official, as he cited a hypothetical case.

"Suppose," he said, "that soviet Russia, or some other country should build a gigantic fleet of submarines and attack British commerce. If we found it necessary, we would proceed at once to construct such additional weapons as were required to cope with the situation, regardless of the Hughes program. We would notify to the other powers and proceed to construction."

To sum it all up, it was stated, Great Britain regards war as an automatic release from the restrictions imposed by the Hughes program.

These clarifications from official British sources, coming on top of the agreement that has been reached to exclude the Japanese homeland from the provisions of the Pacific treaty, are expected to allay nearly all of the senatorial opposition to the set of treaties that will emerge from the conference.

MADAME HARRIS SINGS ANTHEMN BEAUTIFULLY

She sings the number beautifully with exquisite tone.

Incidentally the circus band, led by Tom Peterson, a well known band master in the circus world, plays the accompaniment.

Madame Harris has a repertoire of songs in six languages. She spent several years in Berlin studying and singing the Wagnerian operas. She is a dramatic soprano and she speaks well for the taste of Arthur Davis, producer of the Shrine circus, that he went to the expense of securing Madame Harris to sing the opening number of the show. A second rate singer might have "got by" because no one expects to hear a great voice at a circus, but Mr. Davis knew that a voice such as that of Madame Harris would add the undoubted touch of class which distinguishes the current circus from the ordinary run of shows.

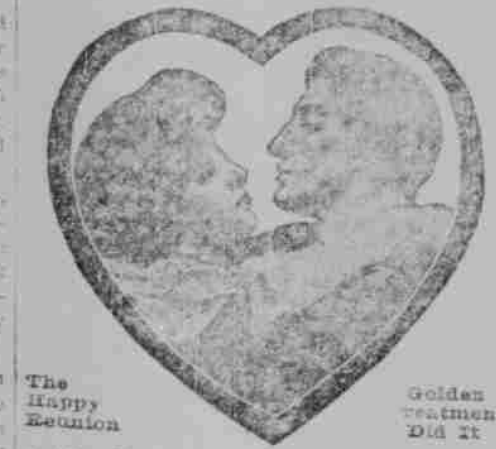
