

## LIVE NEWS FROM THE TWIN CITIES

FOR NEW H. S. BUILDING

Feeling that the opportune time has presented itself, the board of education of East Chicago has again taken under advisement the project of constructing a new public high school building on the west side of the city. This new building would be known as the Benjamin Harrison high school and according to plans and specifications is estimated to cost \$600,000. This proposed building in comparison with the Washington high school would be much larger and would occupy a greater space of ground than both the Washington High and Washington Grade Schools on the east side of the city.

An option of three sites for the location of this school building is named. The present site of the Benjamin Harrison grade school building, purchasing additional acreage, abutting this property that would necessitate the condemnation of more than five buildings adjoining is given as one location. south of North End Park on 141st st., east of Forsyth avenue. While the third piece of property to be considered for the location of this building and as the last alternative would be the purchase of land in the Hammond limits east of White Oak avenue and near Chicago avenue at the same time securing permission of the City of Hammond to annex this strip of ground.

The members of the board are prompted at this time to take the step of constructing a new school building on account of the increased enrollment to house the school children by the eight schools now located in East Chicago and Indiana Harbor. To a certain extent, this handicap is being overcome by the erecting of portable school buildings. One has already been erected in the Main Town site and another is being constructed at the corner of Marion and 141st st.

The members of the board have been feeling their way for over a year as to the logical time to start work on this proposed building. It is the opinion of the majority of the board that a ready market can be secured for the sale of the school bonds. While the labor conditions have not changed much since the first part of 1921, the members of the board view this angle of the project with optimism. Other sides of the question have been thrashed out and with their tentative plans already prepared, the board is of the opinion that conditions are now ripe to commence construction.

At the meeting of the board of education tomorrow evening other points relating to the proposed building of a new high school on the east side of the city will be discussed as a preliminary procedure before presenting the revised plans before the citizens of the city.

## NEW RAIL ORDERS


## FROM DR. GOLDMAN
