

AFTER A 65 HOUR FIGHT JURY DISAGREES

Two Women Said to Be Hanging Verdict in Murder Trial

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15.—After more than sixty-five hours of intermittent discussion the jury in the trial of Arthur C. Burch for the murder of J. Barton Kennedy, was still deliberating his fate today. A hope that the jury was not hopelessly deadlocked was expressed by attorneys for both the state and defense, based on incidents that happened Sunday night.

The jurors were polled by Judge Reeves at 3:30 o'clock and reported they were divided ten to two. Although they did not give an expression as to the result of this halting it was understood that ten were for conviction. Some of the jurors indicated to the court that there was, in their belief, a possibility of an eventual agreement.

At 10:15 last night the jurors were again brought in to court at the request of Mrs. Eva M. Demott, reported to be leading the minority opposing a conviction. She asked Judge Reeves the definition of "preponderance of evidence." After fifty minutes of consultation with state and defense attorneys, Judge Reeves gave a legal definition of the phrase and also instructed the jurors that they "must weigh all evidence in the case which shows any light on sanity or insanity." Mrs. Demott then asked the judge to "wait a second until another vote is taken." Five minutes later word came from the jury room that the jurors wanted to retire for the night, indicating that if a vote had been taken there was still no agreement.

In the event that the jury is unable to reach a verdict, District Attorney Woolwine is ready to proceed immediately with a new trial, he announced.

ARBUCKLE JURY IS STILL INCOMPLETE

Second Week of Second Trial Finds State Ready For a Savage Attack.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal. Jan. 15.—The second trial of Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle for manslaughter, swung into its second week today, with a jury still incomplete.

Attorneys for both sides entered court today determined if possible to complete the jury before adjournment, in order that testimony may start tomorrow.

Although both sides have kept their plans carefully guarded in order that the element of surprise may be retained, it was learned today that the second trial will not be entirely featureless. Witnesses are being groomed by the defense who have not hitherto appeared in the case. It could not be confirmed today but the report was current that Betty Campbell, show girl now in Chicago, and a guest of the Arbuckle party, would appear as a witness in this trial as a girl testifying tending to substantiate the story told by the defendant of the happenings at the gay party after which Virginia Rappe died.

It was also learned that the state plans a savage attack on the credibility of certain defense witnesses. Detectives assigned to the district attorney's office have been busy for weeks, checking on statements made at the first trial by defense witnesses and while District Attorney Brady refuses to disclose information in his possession, he smilingly promises some surprises.

Body of Clarkson Found in St. Louis—End of Sad Love Tragedy.

CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—Thomas J. Clarkson and Miss Dorothy Monell have kept their "rendezvous with death" today and suicide has written "finis" to a romance that could not endure separation.

Clarkson, a chauffeur for Mrs. Elsie G. Monell of St. Louis, the mother of his sweetheart, ended his life twenty-four hours after Miss Monell swallowed poison and died. The police and relatives are convinced that a suicide pact existed between them. Clarkson took poison in St. Louis while Miss Monell ended her life in Chicago.

The couple eloped from St. Louis last week and came to Chicago. Mrs. Monell traced them here and, after bitterly upbraiding Clarkson, who was married although separated from his wife, induced the girl to promise to return home with her. Enroute to the

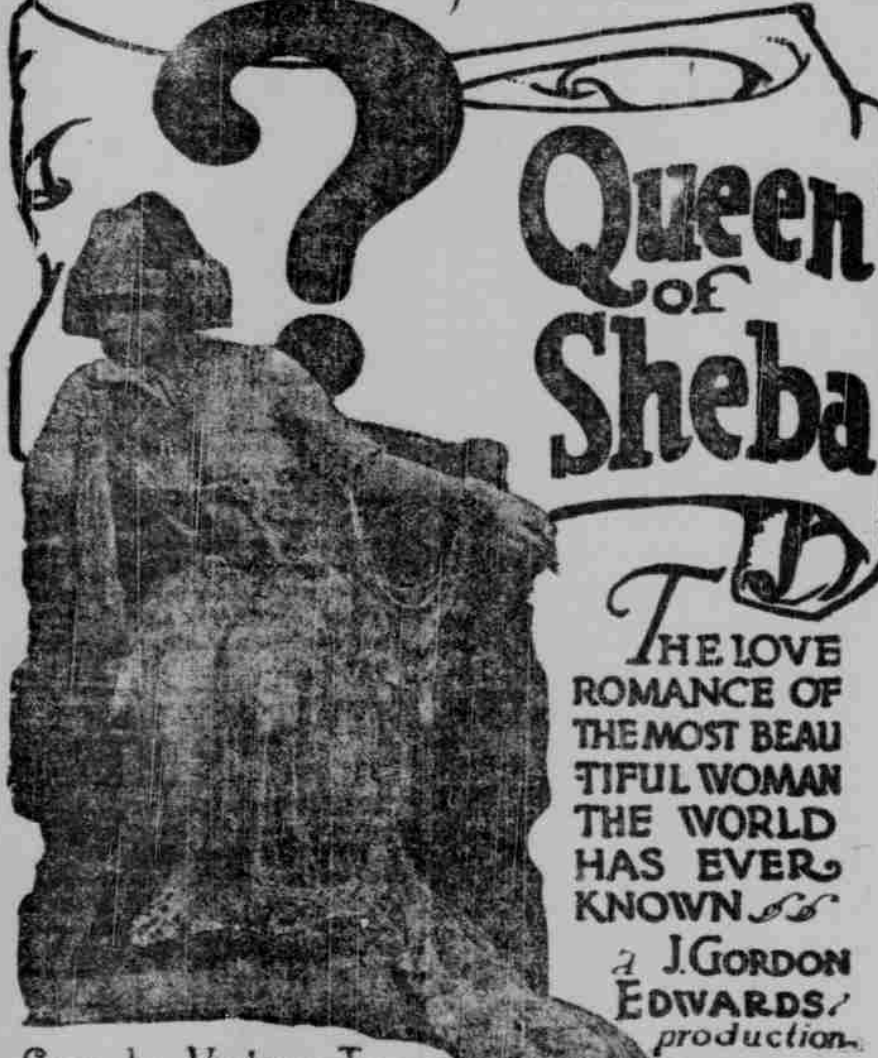
