It is said that the mother had moved the utensils to the rear of the stove with the exception of the soup and stepped into the adjoining room to set the table. While out, the mother believes her baby reached up over the low stove and caused the kettle to turn over.

Attributing neglect and carelessness to the fatal accident of their child, reports from domestic circles in the neighborhood say that the husband beat up his wife. Only two months ago Baby Frank is said to have taken a tumble down a flight of stairs and received a fractured arm.

The burned child is under the care of Dr. Richard J. Dasse of Indiana Harbor.
