RAIL MILL OPERATIONS

The Illinois Central Railroad company has placed an order for 36,000 tons of steel rails. This will effect the operations of the Illinois Steel company of Gary and the rail mills of the Inland Steel company of Indiana Harbor, when this department starts up March 1. The Gary rail mills are scheduled to resume operations next Monday, January 28th.

On this order the Illinois Steel corporation was awarded 11,000 tons, the

Inland Steel 8,000 tons and the Tennessee Iron and Coal company 20,000.

Other victims were Gavel and Kedrosky when this stranger purchased two shirts and gave a check for \$10 and the Colonial Sporting store with a \$7 forged check for five Victoria records.

The strange person, who has forged so many checks in East Chicago and Indiana Harbor the last week, is described as a foot 7 inches tall, dark complexion, weighing about 130 pounds and when last seen he wore a soft felt hat and light overcoat.

The East Chicago police have the case under investigation.

THREE NEW RAIDS

And still more stills are found! Next Thursday will be the end of one month's unceasing efforts of the East Chicago and Indiana Harbor police forces, under the direction of Chief Stroms, to rid the city of violators of the state liquor law.

Night raids, day raids, any old raid and yet the police seem to be able to go out any time and pick out a violator of the prohibition law.

Yesterday afternoon three new places were raided and the producer arrested. Two of these homes were found to have stills in operation, while interlocuting liquor was the only thing in sight in the third place. At 4735 Ted avenue, there was an argument between the husband and wife as to who was the producer. The spouse, Joseph Grimes with his moonshiners still was finally selected to accompany the officers to the police station.

Stanley Weisner, 4822 Homestead avenue, and Christ Stasavich, 3516 Kunkel, were the other two persons to be arrested, when home brew and the evidence of manufacturing a grade of spirits in violation of the eighteen amendment were found.
