

WIFE SHOTS HUSBAND IN ACCIDENT

Unaware that there was a bullet in the rifle which she was handling, Mrs. Hollis Walker, colored, of Gary, accidentally pulled the trigger and a moment later her husband dropped to the floor of the home with a bullet through his stomach and fatally injured.

The shooting took place at 3265 Massachusetts st., last Tuesday morning. Walker was rushing to St. Antonio hospital, where he died yesterday. Both were questioned by the police and coroner and told the same details.

According to their story, both were excited over the drug store hold-up at 2300 Broadway Monday night and Tuesday morning when Walker returned from his work they were talking about it. He got the rifle which a moment later caused his death and was instructing her how to handle it when it was discharged.

Edith Wyndner, also colored, 1732 Madison st., may die as a result of being struck on the head by a bullet fired from a revolver of her step-son, James B. Kelley, following heated argument at the home last night.

According to Kelley's story to the police, they have been quarreling for months. His step-daughter, as stated, did not like him and at very opportunity called him vile names. Last night, during an argument, she is alleged to have called him more names, and he shot her. He threw the gun back of a trunk, was arrested and is being held in a charge of shooting with intent ending the outcome of his step-daughter's injuries.

ALSHULER STORE TO CLOSE SHORTLY

Was First Department Store in Gary and Will Close by the 15th of April.

As rumored some months ago, before staging the big price slashing sales, the H. Alschuler Co. store, the second largest department store in Gary, is going out of business.

This was the official announcement made by Harry Alschuler, a very pioneer, who has been head of the Alschuler store for the past fourteen years. He stated this morning that the store would close the fifteenth of April, when the house of Muscat, Gary's leading furniture house, will take possession vacating their present location on Broadway.

The store lease covers a period of five years at an annual rate of \$15,000 a year, or \$75,000 for the period. The building is 125 feet square, with two floors and a large spacious basement. It is owned by the Phillips Building Co., a stock company of Gary people.

Mr. Alschuler came to Gary in 1907 and located at the same address. At that time, however, the store only had a fifty foot frontage, but several years ago it was remodeled into the present structure. It was the first department store in the city. He has not decided what he will do in the future.
