ROBINSON TO SPEAK

Ardent workers for the candidacy of Albert J. Beveridge for United States Senator, announce that another Beveridge meeting will be held at the East Chicago Masonic Temple, tomorrow night.

James Robinson of Indianapolis, Senator Frank N. Davis of Gary and former city judge, Hyman M. Cohen are scheduled to speak.

Owing to the fact that Albert J. Beveridge did not visit either East Chicago or Indiana Harbor while on his visit to Lake County recently, it is believed to be the reason for this last minute meeting. Then too, the captains of the Beveridge campaign failed to credit Mayor Lew Shanks of Indianapolis with very much when visiting Indiana Harbor a few weeks ago and drawing less than 200 persons. Hence the meeting tomorrow night.

HOME TALENT PLAY

The four sub-lodges of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin workers of the Twin Cities have consolidated in giving a home talent play to be held at the McKinley school auditorium tomorrow night for the benefit of their co-workers in Newport, Kentucky.

Godfrey, general chairman of the local lodge and the Harmond citizens' band will form at the McKinley school and proceed through the business sections of the city, returning to the school again to witness the entertainment.

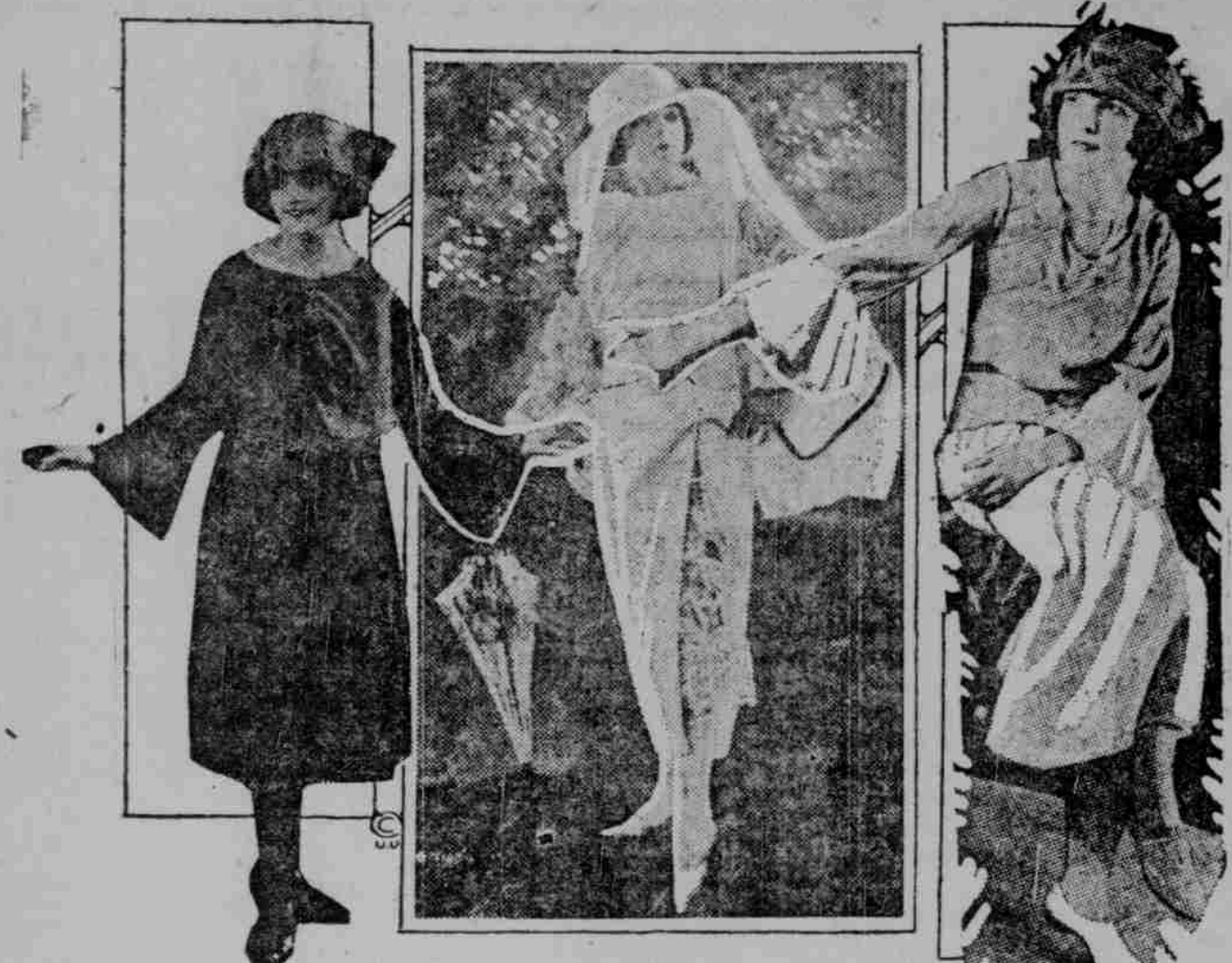

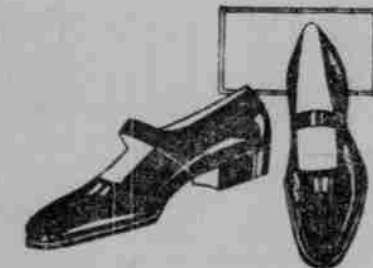
