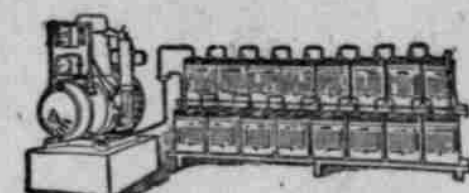
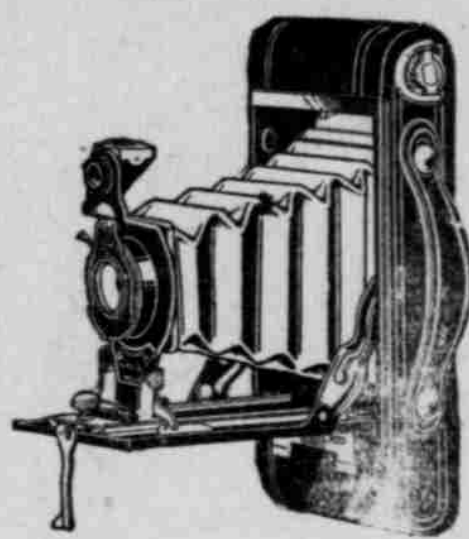

## POULTRY NOTES

Gather the eggs twice daily.

Market the eggs at least twice a week.

Keep the eggs in a cool, dry room or cellar.

Keep the nests clean; provide one nest for every four hens.

Grease will give a gloss to an egg, and it will also close up the pores of the shell, and decay quickly follows.
