Had to Go to Court to Collect Automobile Loss

A man named Zully at East St. Louis, Ill., insured a roadster in an "Automobile Insurance Association" which operates in that neck of the woods. In due process of time the machine caught fire and took its departure via a thin blue wisp of smoke. (Residue purchased by junk dealer.) For reasons not disclosed, the "Insurance Association" denied liability and refused to pay the fire claim. Mr. Zully got a judgment in court, specifying that all policy holders of the Association were liable pro rata—25c on each \$100 of insurance.

The first judgments have been obtained against Ike Cohen of East St. Louis for \$1c and against Judge E. C. Kramer of the same city for \$4.10.
