PRICE CONTROL BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

ADMINISTRATION MEASURE IS
PASSED BY HOUSE OF REP-
RESENTATIVES 68 TO 8.

UPPER BRANCH MAY ACCEPT

Opposition on Final Vote Equally
Divided Between Repub-
licans and Democrats.

Indianapolis, July 19.—Following the passage of the administration coal control commission bill by the house of representatives by a vote of 68 to 8 on Saturday, the house adjourned until Monday afternoon. The senate adjourned until the same date.

Representative Johnson of Grant county, chairman of the committee on rights and privileges, to which the bill had been referred by Speaker Eschbach, reported that the committee was unanimous for the passage of the bill, with lengthy amendments.

The bill with its amendments, referred to by Chairman Johnson as "the substitution bill" provides for the establishment of the "Indiana coal commission," the duties of which are to investigate all coal conditions, fix prices for which coal may be sold, conduct hearings when coal profiteering is suspected, and take over mines for operation by the state if deemed necessary.

Three members will compose the commission, it is provided. One member will be named by the governor, one by the lieutenant-governor, and the third by the speaker of the house of representatives. The member appointed by the governor will act as chairman of the commission. Not more than two of the members composing the commission shall belong to the same political party.

Convict Labor Not to be Used.

In the event of taking over of a mine by the state, the operating and working conditions and wages paid the men will be the same as the scale paid by other mines, and no convict labor will be used.

The commission will serve until March 21, 1921, at which time it will go out of existence unless continued by subsequent legislation.

Further provisions are made in the proposed measure for the placing of a fine or imprisonment, or both, upon coal operators who refuse to show their books to the commission or an order from such body. One member may conduct a hearing, and the salaries of the members of the commission are to be fixed at \$6,000 per year each, with a salary of \$3,000 a year for a secretary of the commission.

Those who voted against the bill were: Republicans—Cann, Jinnett, Miller of Marion, Sambor. Democrats—Barker of Posey, Bidaman, Griffith, Scott.

When the bill had been passed Speaker Eschbach made a ringing speech from the chair on the evils of the present situation.

"I don't blame some of you for being afraid of commissions," said Mr. Eschbach. "Most of these legislative and congressional commissions are pussy-footers. If the appointment of this commission remains in the hands of the three officials designated in the bill, I assure you that if one of the other two will help me there will be nothing to conceal in the deliberations of this body and the guilty ones will be punished. I'll be perfectly willing to name the minority member of this commission, and I shall search the state for a man with nerve enough to go up against the coal barons of this state.

Objectionable Feature Pointed Out.

One of the most objectionable features of the bill is that it gives the commission the right "to condemn any mine," according to Representative Miller of Marion. This section, 19, provides that if the state should take any coal mine all funds derived from the sale of coal in the state-owned mine should be placed in a special fund to be used in operating such a mine or paying compensation to the owners of the mine. This in effect would be the same as a state-owned mine, only for a shorter period of time.

Favorable Sentiment Growing.

More sentiment in favor of the \$10,000,000 appropriation for the world war measure was heard among members of the legislature than has been expressed at any other time, and it is believed that the joint caucus committee will agree on an appropriation bill without any reservations of any character.

Minority Report Substituted.

Two reports were submitted to the house by the ways and means committee on the bill of Representative Johnson (Rep.), which provides for the return to local tax units of control over bond issues and tax levies, which now rests with the state board of tax commissioners. A majority report favored indefinite postponement of the measure, while a minority report favored the bill's passage. The minority report was substituted for the majority report by a vote of 67 to 14.

DAVID SUCCEEDS SAUL AS KING.

LESSON TEXT—II Sam. 2:1-7; 5:1-5.
GOLDEN TEXT—Trust in the Lord with

The death of Saul lay open to David the path to the throne. This would have rejoiced the heart of many, but David was sad. Instead of reward being given to the slayer of Saul, quick vengeance was executed upon him.

I. David Made King Over Judah (2:1-4).

He knew full well that the Lord by the hand of Samuel had anointed him to be the successor of Saul. He had learned the essential lesson which the School of Providence was designed to teach, namely, that the position now open to him was no easy one to fill. His exile and sufferings gave him self-control. He had the good sense to know that promotion to the throne did but bring "harder duties and multiplied perplexities." He threw himself upon God and asked for guidance. He rendered instant obedience to the Lord's answer. If we are to enjoy God's fellowship and blessing we must render quick obedience. He made a right beginning, therefore God prospered him. When he reached Hebron the men of Judah came and anointed him king over them. Thus a part of the nation recognized him as king and ratified the work which Samuel did many years before. When David went up to Hebron with all who had been with him in exile and suffering, they are now sharers with him in the kingdom. When David's great son, Christ, shall enter upon his glorious reign, those who have been faithful to him in his rejection shall reign with him. "If we suffer we shall also reign with him." (II Tim. 2:12); "To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, and am set down with my father in his throne." (Rev. 3:21).

II. David's Behavior Toward the Men of Jabesh-Gilead (2:4-7).

The men of Jabesh owed much to Saul (I Sam. 11), and they showed this recognition of debt by making a daring dash to rescue his body from the ignominious exposure at Bethel. David's act of sending men to Jabesh with a message of good will for their affectionate remembrance of Saul was an exhibition of his noble generosity. His love for the unfortunate king survived all the injuries which he suffered at his hands. He forgave and forgot them all. This was an act of political shrewdness as well as a generous one. In fact the only policy which proves effective is that which proceeds from a generous heart. He deftly follows this generous commendation with a solicitude for the men of Jabesh to transfer their loyalty to himself, since he is now their legal king. Since Saul is now dead, he urges them to be valiant for him. In view of the civil war which was to follow he knew it would require valiant men to stand by God's king. This appeal to be valiant is needed now, for we are all called upon to take sides between God's appointed king, Jesus Christ, and Satan, the pretender to the throne. May Christ's appeal result in making us faithful and valiant for him.

III. The Dual Kingdom—War Between the House of Saul and the House of David (2:8-4:12).

This period of civil war lasted seven and a half years. Most of the tribes of Israel clung to Ishbosheth. Saul's son, whom Abner had proclaimed king at Mahanaim. Feuds continued between the rival generals. David's power increased while that of Ishbosheth's waned.

IV. David Crowned King Over United Israel (5:1-5).

Though the struggle for supremacy lasted long and was a bitter one, Abner's death and Ishbosheth's assassination put an end to David's opposition. David's behavior during this time gradually won for him the confidence of the tribes so that they all came to him at Hebron and anointed him as their king. They accepted his divine right to rule (v. 5). The reasons for anointing him their king were:

1. He is their brother (v. 1). This is true of Christ our King. Through the incarnation he has become one with us.

2. He was their true leader in war, even in Saul's time (v. 2).

3. He was the Lord's choice (v. 2).

Procrastination.

Procrastination is helping the devil in retarding righteousness in the world. Remember that legend of how he summoned his imperial staff and offered reward to the member who would suggest the best way to destroy a human soul. One said, Convince him there is no God. Another said, Prove there is no immortality and no truth in the Bible. But still another suggested, Convince him that there is no hurry about his carrying out his good resolutions. And the devil gave that one the prize.—Bishop Talbot.
