Synopsis of the proceedings of the Democratic County Convention held at Albion Sept. 1, 1858.

Not having a full official report, we have not either space nor time for an extended account of the proceedings, but give merely the principal features of the "shows," which, we are informed, passed off very harmoniously for a Democratic Meeting.

Gilbert Sherman Esq., was chosen Chairman, E. B. Woodward Secretary. On motion Mr. Stanley was unanimously nominated as candidate for the Assembly. On motion convention proceeded to ballot for Sheriff. On the first ballot Avery Earl, of Wayne Township, received a majority of all the votes cast, and was unanimously declared nominated.

On motion proceeded to nominate a candidate for Treasurer, and on the 3d ballot James Denny Esq., of Albion was declared nominated.

E. B. Gerber of this village was nominated for Surveyor.

The present incumbents were re-nominated as Commissioners.

The resolutions adopted were the usual stereotyped ones, supporting the nominees of the party.
