

**Reuben J. Dawson.****Where he stood in 1848-9.**

At the session of the Legislature of 1848 and 49 Reuben J. Dawson was a member of the Senate, and voted for the following Joint Resolution:

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana, That our Senators be instructed and our Representatives in Congress requested, so to cast their votes and extend their influence to have engrailed on any law that may be passed for the organization of the territory recently acquired from Mexico, a provision forever excluding from such territory, slavery and involuntary servitude, otherwise than in the punishment of crimes, whereof the party has been duly convicted.*

He was also a member of the State convention on the 5th of January 1849, and voted for the platform which declared it to be the duty of Congress to prevent the introduction of Slavery within the limits of the new territories.

It was a manly and an honorable position, and Mr. Dawson sustained his position like a true Democrat and an honest man.

Now Mr. Dawson is a candidate for Congress. His party has turned square about and he has turned with them—having resolved to stick to his party right or wrong, no matter what they do, or what they believe, he is today the advocate and defender of the Dred Scott decision—denies the power of Congress or even of the people of a territory to control or keep out the institution of slavery.
