Reinstatement of War Risk Insurance.

Under a new and very liberal ruling of far reaching importance to millions of former service men, issued by Director R. G. Chelmsley Jones of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance with the approval of Secretary of the Treasury Carter Glass, War Risk (term) Insurance, regardless of how long it may have been lapsed or canceled, and regardless of how long the former service man may have been discharged, may be reinstated any time before July 1, 1929.

The only conditions are:
(1) Two monthly premiums on the amount of insurance to be reinstated must accompany the application.
(2) The applicant must be in as good health as at the date of discharge or at the expiration of the grace period, whichever is the later date, and so date in the application.
