Indiana District Court Divided Into Seven Division Under Measure

What is known as the Hickey federal court bill has passed the U. S. senate with amendments and it now goes back to the house for concurrence. The bill provides for two judges of the Indiana federal court and the district is divided into seven divisions. Under provisions of the measure court will be held in Indianapolis Terre Haute, Evansville, New Albany, Hammond South Bend and Fort Wayne. The bill will reach the president next week and if he approves it the measure becomes a law. As Federal Judge A. B. Anderson is to be promoted to the district federal court in Chicago there will be two new judges to be appointed for Indiana.
