It is said the crossing where the accident occurred is included in a list of grade crossings proposed to be abolished.

The funeral was first planned to be held Sunday but was changed to Tuesday when a telegram was received from Mrs. Dale Riddenbach sister of the deceased to the effect that she is enroute to Waukesha from her home in California.
