TAXES DISTRIBUTED FOR FALL

Delinquent Tax In County Is \$21,000.
Report of Treasurer Cockley
Shows Just Made Public

Taxes collected by County Treasurer Herbert Cockley during the fall tax paying period amounted to \$451,400.70 and this sum has been distributed among the various taxing units by County Auditor Orville Pressler. Checks have also been prepared by County Auditor Pressler for the trustees' distribution for the spring installment of taxes approximately \$526,000 was collected. The outstanding taxes of the county aggregate \$21,000 according to Treasurer Cockley as given in the Kendallville News Sun.

The distribution of taxes goes to state, county and township funds and one of the largest items of expense to be borne by taxpayers is for school purposes.

The distribution of the fall installment of taxes is as follows: State tax \$11,343.99, state school, \$17,114.24, state benevolent \$18,721.23; state educational \$11,693.34; state vocational \$1,171.59; Dunes park fund, \$467.73; Soldiers' Memorial, \$1,403.21; state agricultural \$935.43; state teachers pension \$3,506.67 state board of agriculture \$584.64 county tax revenue, \$21,864.88; gravel road repair \$21,045.12; county unit road bond and interest \$44,728.68; township road bond and interest \$39,636.56; township tax \$10,420.43 toll tax \$64,709.52; special school fund \$84,190.07 township road tax, \$38,620.37 township poor tax \$2,798.14 library tax, \$2,787.99; school bond \$16,657.54; building fund \$3,546.58; corporations, \$16,495.21 electric light fund \$2,219.63; water works fund \$1,610.62; mortgage bonds \$3939.70; county park tax \$114.95 township vocational \$1518.40; kindergarten tax \$303.68 treasurer's 6 per cent fee \$1029.40 taxes returned \$220.81.

The total amount of the county taxes that will be distributed to the state funds from the fall installment is approximately \$66,942.42.

Everyone is asking Have you seen Chickie? She's at Crystal tonight.


Eastern Star to Meet.
