

our produce through the northern Lakes, Haron and St. Clair but at very limited periods of the year, and even then, consequently, at great expense, and besides this there is no other way to find a market whose expenses will not exceed the amount of our products. In this condition there remaineth no hope to your petitioners but in the grant of this their most earnest prayer, namely, a Rail-Road which will connect the waters of Michigan with the waters of Lake Erie.

The Hon. Lucius Lyon, Delegate to Congress from the Territory of Michigan and the Hon. Senators and Representatives of the State of Indiana to Congress, are most earnestly and respectfully requested to take charge of this petition and see that it be presented and urged according to its intrinsic merits.

Voted that the several Editors of News papers in this Territory be requested to publish the proceedings of this meetings with the petition. Also voted that fifty copies of the petition be printed for circulation.

On motion, Resolved, that N. McGaffey, M. Judson and Chas. Kellogg be a committee to call future meetings on this subject, at this place, whenever they may deem it necessary.
