Robbery.

Last Wednesday evening, or Thursday morning, a young man by the name of Gipe, employed as Clerk in the Express office at this place, left on the midnight train for the east, with about four thousand dollars, which had been sent to Mr. Broad, contractor on the Fort Wayne Railroad, west of this. His absence was discovered about three o'clock, and Dr. Lemon, the Express Agent, and Mr. Morse, Depot Sup't., started on board a locomotive, at six o'clock for the east. When they arrived at Fort Wayne, they sent a telegraph dispatch to the Express Messenger, at Bucyrus, Ohio, and as soon as the train arrived, which Gipe was on, the Messenger had him arrested and lodged in jail. He had all the money with him except five dollars, and when arrested expressed a desire to know "what they are going to do about it." He was brought to this place on Saturday morning last, taken before Esqr. Case, pleaded guilty, and was sent to jail under bond of four thousand dollars, to appear at the next term of the Circuit Court.

An Express Clerk Struck by Lightning!

The above is the caption of an article which appeared in the Daily Chicago Times of the 25th inst., in relation to the arrest of Gipe for robbing the Express office in this place.

The Times says—according to our informant, who obtained a copy of that paper on the cars between this place and La Porte,—that Messrs. PINKERTON & Co., Agents of Chicago, arrested Gipe at Crestline, sometime during the next day after the robbery was committed, and that G. B. LEMMON was the agent from whom the money was stolen. We have no disposition to deprive Messrs. PINKERTON & Co. of any deserved praise for their exertions in ferreting out thieves, and all we desire, is, to give "honor to whom honor is due." Dr. LEMON, Mr. MORSE, Mr. LOCK, engineer, and Mr. FISHER, fireman, left this place, aboard of the "Shanghai" engine, for Ft. Wayne, at about six o'clock, on the morning after the robbery, and traveled at the rate of about sixty miles an hour, between this and Ft. Wayne. On their arrival at Ft. Wayne, they sent a telegraph dispatch to Bucyrus, to the Express Messenger, who was on the same train with Gipe. Between Bucyrus and Crestline, the messenger found Gipe and invited him into the express car, where he made him disgorge the stolen money. Dr. LEMON took the next train and arrived at Crestline before Messrs. PINKERTON & Co.'s dispatches were received. Therefore our readers will perceive that Messrs. LEMON, MORSE, LOCK and FISHER, of Plymouth, Ind., deserve all the praise, for their courage in running the engine so fast over a new road, endangering their lives every minute by running off the track or into some work train. We hope the Times will make the correction, and give "honor to whom honor is due."

We have not received our copy of the Times up to the time of going to press, in consequence of which we may have something to say on the subject in our next issue.

A Shoemaker, by trade, whose name we have not learned, was arrested on Sunday last, for robbing a man's trunk of about eighty dollars in gold. He was held to bail in the sum of one hundred dollars for his appearance, and was present at 1 o'clock on Monday. All the witnesses present were examined, and for the absence of the defendant's main witness the investigation was adjourned until Tuesday morning 9 o'clock. Between Monday evening and Tuesday morning the defendant took "leg bail," and has not since been heard of.

Mr. Brownlee, on opening his goods the other day, found, to his great surprise, that over one hundred dollars worth of Yankee Notions had been taken from one of the boxes. Of course LEECH's fist line will make good the loss.

Robert C. Corbally, who was arrested on the 21st of March last, for robbing the Post Office in this place, has been sentenced to two years in the State's Prison.

A friend from Warsaw tells us that it is reported in that place, that Wm. H. Thompson is the person that took the money from the Express Office in this place.—Mr. Thompson has not been connected with the Express office since about the first of last March. The Indian will confer a favor by setting the matter O. K.

There has been more stealing going on in this vicinity for the past two or three months, than is really desirable to the good citizens of Plymouth. But we have the satisfaction of knowing that the perpetrators, with one or two exceptions, have been caught, and justice meted out to them in due form of law.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the President and Trustees of the town of Plymouth, in the county of Marshall and State of Indiana:

That it is hereby declared, that all persons are prohibited from hitching or standing their horse or horses, team or teams, wagon or wagons, up in the cross walks of the streets or alleys, within the corporation, to the annoyance of persons traveling on foot, also, from riding or driving the same on the side walks of said town.

And it is further ordained, That any and all persons guilty of the same shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined many sum not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars for each and every such offense, to be collected in an action of debt, before any Justice of the Peace having competent jurisdiction.

And it is further ordained, That all persons are hereby prohibited from obstructing the side walks with boxes, wood, or anything that will obstruct the same, under a penalty of not less than one nor more than ten dollars, for each such obstruction remains, after being notified by the Marshal to remove the same; to be collected in the manner above specified.
