For the Doctors.

At this particular juncture, there is no small amount of talk in our little town about the "Doctors," and the "Medical Society" organized in this county. We copy from a late number of the New York Times, the following article as being of interest in relation to the matter:

"INTERESTING TO PHYSICIANS.—The Supreme Court of the eighth Judicial District has rendered a decision in an action brought by Dr. John D. Hill against the Erie County Medical Society, to restore him to the enjoyment of his privilege as a member of the society, from which he had been expelled because of an alleged infraction of the tariff of prices adopted by the society. That infraction consisted, and was claimed by the defendant, in taking the office of physician to the Almshouse of Erie county, for a less sum than the minimum price fixed by the tariff. The following are the conclusions of the court:

1. The regulation (the tariff of prices) in question was unauthorized.
 2. It was unreasonable.
 3. It was against public policy and the law.
 4. The disfranchisement of the relator was unauthorized and illegal.
- It follows that he must be restored or recognized as a member of the Medical Society, and permitted, without molestation, to enjoy the rights and privileges of a member.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the president and board of Trustees of the corporate town of Plymouth in the county of Marshall and State of Indiana, at a special meeting:

That hereafter, all sidewalks built in said town, where there are two or more business rooms on one block fronting the same street, to be constructed as follows: The walk shall be built of white-oak or black-walnut plank, not less than one and a half inches thick, and not more than eight inches wide, and laid on three parallel string pieces not less than four inches square, of the same material as the plank; and the walk so constructed is to be ten feet wide, and well spiked to the stringers, of a uniform width across the block. It is hereby made the duty of the Marshal of said town, to see that all persons hereafter building or repairing side-walks, shall comply with the requisitions of this ordinance.

It is hereby declared that an emergency exists for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance, and the same shall be in force from and after its publication in the Marshall County Democrat.
