Escaped Fred Gipe.

Frederick Gipe, who robbed the Express Office at this place, about a year ago, of some \$100, for which he was sentenced to one year imprisonment in our County Jail, has escaped on Tuesday last.

The Sheriff, Mr. Van Valkenburgh, was absent on official business, and there being no one present at the time but the female portion of the family, the prisoner had a good start before any but those living in the jail knew of his escape. We happened to go to the back door of the Court-house a few moments after his escape, and were informed that he was gone, and looking down towards the Railroad, we caught a glimpse of him just as he was crossing over into the swamp. We set out in full chase, and done some tail running, until we "gave out," but no sight or trace could we find of him. By this time, quite a number of men had assembled—diligent search was made, but up to the hour of going to press, nothing has been heard of him.

The Sheriff has offered a reward of \$100 for the arrest of Gipe, and is making every effort in his power to catch him.

Mr. Houghton's collar-bone was broken; he sustained some other slight injuries. Although not dangerous, the accident will cause him much pain before he recovers.
