I will endeavor to give you a correct account of the speech of our old patriotic friend, Col. May, which he delivered here on the 9th inst. The Col. was accompanied by our worthy candidate for Auditor, Mr. Thomas McDonald.

About two o'clock, the large crowd repaired to the School-house where Col. May was to speak. The Colonel, after a few introductory remarks, gave us a most happy description of the two political parties in this country--tracing them back to 1836. He proved that Schuyler Colfax had been a leader of the Know Nothing party in 1854, and during the full term the party had an existence. (This same Colfax is now canvassing the District, begging the votes of the same people that only four years ago he was sworn before his God, to deprive of a privilege that God had given them--that of being an American citizen.

May during his speech, he would cry out "Bah!" and occasionally interrupt him. The Col. very goodnaturedly told this man what he thought of him, which appeared to affront him very much.

After Col. May was seated, the foul mouthed old creature arose to speak, receiving great applause from one Republican who has a tremendous long nose. He said that James Buchanan was an illiterate drunkard, and that Stephen Arnold Douglas (as he called him) "was not fit to clean the spittoons in a bigger's barber shop." His other allusions to the Democracy were made in such filthy language, every man who heard him will admit that they are entirely unfit for publication. Still the Republicans gave him the most enthusiastic applause. He appeared much embarrassed at the applause--seized his hat, and was about to leave.

At this moment there was much confusion. Some one cried out "Come back, Stephen." Another cried out "Come back, beggar, and hear what Col. May has to say." Another voice: "Stop thief!" He then halted to hear Col. May, but in a few moments sneaked out of the room.

Plymouth, Saturday, Sept. 4th 1858.

Society met, pursuant to adjournment.

Daniel Brown, presented the written contract of C. Cushman, for erecting fence around Fair ground, which was ordered to be recorded.

D. S. Conger asked and was excused from serving on Farming Implements.

Whereupon, L. Crane was appointed in his stead.

Ordered, that the time of holding the 4th annual Fair of this Society be deferred till Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Oct. 13th, 14th, and 15, 1858.

Ordered that the Committee on fencing and preparing fair ground, erect a building 10 feet wide, and 20 feet long, at the entrance gate, for the use of the Treasurer and Secretary. Also that they erect a platform for the use of the judges, at some point around the race ground, if deemed necessary. Also that said Committee be instructed to erect a shed 12 feet wide, along the west fence, the fence joining the west side, of sufficient length to cover articles for exhibition, (with a table in the centre,)--covered with boards, so that they can be moved immediately after the fair--the posts to be fixed in the ground.

The Committee shall erect the same convenient to one of the west gates, and in their directions on the most available ground having in view that it is only for temporary purposes.
